Rural Credits Loans Declared Timely Now

O. A. C., Corvallis, Ore., March 31.—(Special)—Farmers of Union county who contemplate making loans from the State Rural Credits fund may secure blanks and instructions by applying to the State Land Board attorney for this county, H. E. Dixon, La Grande.

"A good deal of confusion exists," says Dr. Hector Macpherson, "as to how to proceed to get a loan. Intending borrowers should call up their county representative of the state land board, who can supply them with blanks and give them instructions. Loans may be made for 10, 20, 30 or 36 year periods. Borrowers are advised to take the 36 year loans, which can be paid, principal and interest, in 35 annual payments. If able to pay sooner they may pay as fast as they please, and interest will be stopped on all partial payments as soon as made."

Haines School Record.

The Haines school board has engaged the principal and assistant for the next term of school, thus making the corps of instructors complete. The application of Prof. H. L. Moss of Imbler, Union county, was accepted, while Miss Alta Davis was elected as assistant.

Prof. Moss, formerly of Iowa, is recommended as a thorough instructor and has a satisfactory record at Imbler, where he has served in a similar capacity for the past year. Miss Davis is well known here, having occupied a position in the Haines schools for the past two years, proving herself a most efficient teacher. The other teachers are Miss Ellen Long, primary; Miss Adah Irwin, third and fourth grades; Miss Edith Peale, fifth and sixth grades; Miss Esta Smith, seventh and eighth grades.—Haines Record.

Massive X Ray Machine Installed

Now Being Installed at the Grande Ronde Hospital—Represents Very Latest Modern Equipment.

Through the efforts of the directors, a modern, up-to-date X-ray machine, capable of doing as good work as any in the state, is being installed at the Grande Ronde hospital by the factory representatives. The hospital has always had up-to-date equipment in this department. The X-ray machine has been improved so much within the last few years that all machines made before that date are now considered in a sense antiquated.

This machine projects a high tension electrical current, twenty-two times more powerful than that used in Auburn prison, New York, for the electrocution of those condemned to death. The transformer of this machine steps up the ordinary line voltage of 220 volts, to more than 135,000 volts, but still this current is not dangerous—a strong shock would be felt if one should touch a high tension wire, but it would not burn.

Connecting the high tension wires of this machine to an X-ray tube, and turning on the current, sends a stream of invisible rays through the human body and reveals upon a sensitized plate a photograph of the internal organs, without the patient being aware that anything has happened.

By switching this current of 135,000 volts into the radioscope (an apparatus for viewing the body with the naked eye) and placing the patient in front of the X-ray tube, a moving picture of the internal organs, heart, lungs, stomach and intestines in actual operation is thrown upon a sensitized screen.

By means of the new apparatus, the radioscope, the rays are so carefully filtered and calculated that the subject is absolutely protected from any chance of X-ray burn, which has caused so much trouble in the past through previous scientific ignorance of the mystic properties of the X-ray, which is so closely allied to the rays of radium.

The management is being congratulated upon keeping their institution abreast with the times providing for the people of this city and surrounding country all the facilities for attention along these lines as supplied in the larger centers. In the not far distant future they hope to arrange for an exhibit of X-ray pictures for the benefit of the many people that have never seen this class of work.

Farmers Must Recessed.

Pendleton, Ore., March 31.—(United Press)—Unusual weather of the last winter has cost the wheat growers of the inland empire many thousands of dollars. Seventy-five per cent of the farmers of eastern Oregon, eastern Washington and Idaho must recessed their wheat fields, owing to the lack of snow during the winter and the high wind of a week ago which actually blew the seed from the ground. With wheat selling at more than \$1.50 a bushel, the loss to the farmers who must plant their crop a second time is easily seen. In Umatilla county alone thousands of acres are being reseeded now. The ground in many places is baked and hard. Club varieties of wheat are said to have suffered most.

Girl Boosts Enlisting.

Portland, Ore., March 31.—(United Press)—A girl—Miss Ruth L. B. Price, a student of the Lincoln high school—had charge of a patriotic mass meeting at the high school auditorium last night. The meeting, presided over from beginning to end by Miss Price, was intended to stimulate recruiting, and, judging from the crowd and the interest shown, the meeting was a decided success. Army officers, who worked in co-operation with Miss Price, secured the names of scores of young men who were interested in enlisting.
