TRI-SPEAKER IS TO HAVE A MERRY RACE FOR LEADERSHIP

New York, Mar. 31.—(United Press)—Tris Speaker's sudden elevation to the heights of batting championship, sought many years by Joe Jackson, is likely to precipitate one of the hottest scraps in the American league dash for the top of the average list this year that Ban Johnson's or any other man's circuit ever saw. Joe struggled along for years cracking the leather on lots of base-balls and attaining dizzy batting heights, but Ty Cobb always was just good enough to pull out in the lead. Speaker came along with a new club, and hit 'em so fast and often that Cobb was forced to look on from a rear seat, while Jackson merely hooked on in third place. Joe has issued his challenge for this year. He says the name once boasted by a President of the United States is going to be right at the top when Ban B. promulgates next summer's most important list in the lives of batters. Cobb, he says, may be second, or even Speaker may get that far, but he has served warning that Joe is going to ride the winning horse. Cobb also has made some passing remarks in which he intimated that

there isn't going to be glory without a few sprints in the summer. He has set his eyes on that batting championship and wants it badly enough to stretch his legs hard for every blow. Cobb, so one story has it, was a very much disappointed peach when the last season was over and the customary Cobb was lacking at the head of the American league averages. He had acquired such a Ben Adhem habit that it was hard to let go. He was grieved and somewhat astonished to observe that it wasn't Jackson who challenged him, but Speaker, main cog in a machine which shouldn't have placed him that high. And just to keep competition from growing stagnant and carrying all interest to the younger league, the National league probably will fling a little dust around in staging its battle for leadership. Jack Daubert, long recognized as king, didn't like it a bit when he was nosed out a year ago. He likes his hits perhaps better than any other star in the game, so he promises to give Hal Chase, Roger Hornsby, Lew McCarthy, and some other aspirants the climb of their young lives for John K. Tener's heaviest batting average. All around it should be a busy little season for the average fiend.

KILBANE CERTAINLY AN AMBITIOUS CUSS

New York, March 31.—Johnny Kilbane, the champion featherweight, having beaten all the featherweights they can dig up for him, has been trying for a long time to get a crack at the topnotch lightweights with but little success. So, just to show what a good fellow he is, and what a whale of a scrapper he is, today issued a deft to the three best who claim lightweight class and offered to meet them all in the same night. He began with Freddie Welsh and went right down to Benny Leonard and Richie Mitchell, the two latter having been extremely persistent in telling what they would do to Kilbane if the opportunity ever offered. However, there is the cutest little jester imaginable in Johnny's challenge that tempers his boldness to a considerable extent. He specified in his death-defying edict that he wanted each of these men to weight in at 133 pounds ringside, which long has been recognized as the legitimate lightweight poundage.

"They aren't lightweights," Johnny announces, "and they won't take my offer. However, I'm willing to fight any of the three or all of them at any old weight they name, one a night. And I'll do the best job of housecleaning in the lightweight division this country has seen for many a long day."

The champion featherweight is a most awful lonesome boxer. Instead of all the boxers in his class following him around the country and clamoring for matches, an experience most of the scrappers of high rank have, they all get out of his way when he starts traveling. A great many of them have felt the full force of that deadly right, and more of them have heard tales of it that fill them with respect. So Johnny is rather forced into it.

If he can ever get Welsh's consent to meet him in a ring the fight fans in this nation will wear out the railroad ties getting to the scene of the mill.

No Place To Hang Him, Indian May Escape

Spokane, Wash., March 31.—(United Press)—Because there is no place in which to hang him, Edward Mayberry, half breed Indian, probably will escape the death sentence imposed for the murder of Alice Vivian on the Colville reservation last August.

President Wilson granted Mayberry a 30 day respite so his lawyers could appeal from the sentence, on the ground that it could not be legally carried out in the state of Washington, where capital punishment is barred. This respite will expire a week from Sunday.

The woman killed by Mayberry was alleged to be his wife. He said the shooting was accidental. As it occurred on federal government property, United States Judge Rudkin went ahead and condemned Mayberry to death, in spite of Washington's law against executions. The original hanging date was January 19.

Mayberry obtained a postponement until March. Then it was necessary to find a place inside the state boundaries and yet not under state jurisdiction where a gallows could be legally erected. The federal building was deemed United States territory and plans were made to hang Mayberry on the roof. His lawyers objected and demanded a ruling by the treasury department. Mayberry remained calm and carpenters began measuring off a place to build the scaffold.

The treasury department ruled that the plan was illegal. President Wilson granted Mayberry a reprieve to April 10, at which time he will be imprisoned for life, likely.

Army Is Ready.

New York, March 31.—(United Press)—An army of 150,000 men—the National Guard of the United States—is on its toes awaiting the summons. They are fit and ready, from the buckles on the mules' harness and the straps on the "papoose packs" to the big six-inch howitzers in the artillery.

As a unit the national guard is better fitted for actual war service than at any time since the volunteers were mustered out after the Civil war, commanding officers of the different organizations assert. Scores of high officers from every state in the union are here today for the sessions of the National Guard association convention. "Our so-called 'second line of defense' is ready to jump into the first line. They are ready as they have never been before," said General Albert J. Logan of the Pennsylvania National guard today.

SHORT RECRUIT STRETCHED

Kansas City, March 31.—Karl L. Wheeler, who applied for enlistment with the Third Missouri Infantry today, was found to be one inch short of the required five feet, four inches regulation. To remedy the defect a half dozen guardsmen massaged and rolled the applicant for an hour, when he was again brought before the examining physician and was accepted. Wheeler's stature was said to have been decreased as a result of carrying sacks of cement.
