Slides Occur On The Joseph Line

Great Difficulty Is Encountered in Keeping the Branch Open—Huge Slide About Six Miles Below Elgin.

Elgin, March 31.—(Special)—Greater difficulty has been encountered in keeping trains running on the branch line the past week than at any time during the past winter, says the Elgin Recorder. The line is now open.

Some time Tuesday night or early Wednesday morning a huge slide occurred at Mile Post 28, about six miles below Elgin in Grande Ronde canyon and covered the track from one to three feet deep for a distance of over 100 feet. A crew of men and a ditcher were dispatched to the scene rather early Wednesday morning and before passenger No. 32 left Elgin. The crew succeeded in getting the track cleared about noon. The passenger was started out and made the trip safely to Joseph and reached the scene of the slide at 11:00 o'clock Wednesday night to encounter another at exactly the same location. There was not sufficient men on the train to clear the track and the train remained blocked there all night, leaving the passengers without food and beds. A special train was sent from La Grande early Thursday morning, passengers were transferred over the slide and arrived in Elgin about 10:20.

The navy recruiting office is in receipt of information from the navy department at Washington that enlistments are wanted for aviation duty. Technically, aviation men will enlist as landsmen for quartermaster. Men between the ages of 21 and 30 will be accepted and only those who are particularly capable mentally and physically. They will be sent to the Aeronautic station at Pensacola, Florida, for training. The normal course is for 18 months, and after completion of the course, will continue to do aviation at some shore station or be ordered to ships supplied with aircrafts.
