Fate of Lawyer Innes Depends On Finding Girls in S. America

Rio de Janeiro, April 2.—(United Press)—The fate of Victor E. Innes, lawyer, of Portland, Ore., and San Antonio, Texas, accused of the murder of Mrs. Elois Dennis and her sister, Beatrice Nelms, today depends on the finding of the two girls alive in South America, according to advertisements appearing in papers here today. These advertisements are said to have been authorized by South American consuls acting on advice from the State department at Washington. Innes is the lawyer who, the girls' mother alleged, went to Atlanta, Georgia and, after alienating the af-

fection of Mrs. Dennis for her husband, defrauded her of her fortune and then murdered her and her sister in an attempt to make it appear that they had taken money and gone to a foreign land. The advertisements state that after the girls' supposed murder they were seen in Jacksonville, Fla., and that they remarked there that they were about to make a trip to South America and the West Indies. The mother reported this rumor to Washington. So far as can be learned the girls have not been seen in any of the South American countries.

Student at O. A. C. Join U. S. Army

O. A. C. Provides Method of Making up Class Work Lost in Nation's Cause.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, April 2.—(Special)—No scholastic obstacles will be allowed to prevent enlistment for military service at the Oregon Agricultural College. A faculty ruling has been made that will either give credit for work unfinished because of entering the service before the end of the present semester, or provide means of making up the uncompleted work.

Candidates for graduation in June 1917, who withdraw from College for U. S. military service will receive full credit for the second semester's work in all subjects in which they are maintaining a passing grade.

All other students will either receive credit for the unfinished work of the semester or be given an "incomplete, in subjects necessary to required subjects.

When students with incomplete return to College they will be provided with special instruction to enable them to remove the incomplete grade.

Help the Birds.

La Grande, April 2.—(To the Editor)—Now is a good time to plan what you are going to plant to afford food for birds and to beautify your home grounds at the same time.

A number of years ago birds found plenty of wild fruits, seeds and nuts but as the country becomes more thickly settled the wild shrubs and vines are cleared off and the birds are robbed of their natural foods.

Farmers in the East are beginning to plant "thickets" for bird havens and are rewarded by having the birds come back and destroy many harmful insect pests.

Among some of the shrubs and vines that are valuable and also decorative to the home are Woodbine or Virginia Creeper, Bittersweet (vine), Junipers, Rayberry, Sumach, Matrimony Vine, Dogwood, Mountain Ash, Hawthorn, Elders, Barberries, Russian Mulberry, Wild Cherry.

GENTLEMEN OF THE HOUSE MEET MISS CONGRESSWOMAN JEANETTE RANKIN

Washington, April 2.—(United Press)—Representative Jeanette Rankin of Montana, when she walked into the House today, marked the formal change from the old to the new order of things. She invaded a floor that has been kept sacred to men ever since its inception.

Naturally her entrance was regarded with trepidation as well as with interest by congressmen, mostly by the Republican ones, with whom she must fraternize more or less by reason of her party affiliations.

There was some speculation as to whether she would venture into the republican cloakroom. It was generally decided she would not, unless she hardened herself to the necessities—swear words and mingled grades of tobacco smoke from the 5-cent weed or briar pipe to the perfectos and cigarettes.

Miss Rankin's entrance, incidentally, was expected somewhat to cleanse the debate in the house, which on occasion, in the case of backwoods orators, has been sometimes indecent.

TURNING VAGRANCY TO ACCOUNT.

Intimate contact with the class of humanity usually brought before the magistrate led the mayor of Houston, Texas to believe that the system of dealing with minor offenders was wrong. In his estimation a sentence spent in a town jail did not inure to the good of either prisoner or the community. So he devised ways and means of relieving the city of the burden of supporting nonproducers, and incidentally offered prisoners an opportunity to learn the elements of successful farming.

The Houston city farm embraces 319 acres of land just beyond the outskirts of the city. In 10 months' time the city farm has raised crops of cotton, corn, potatoes, sorghum, and peanuts, valued at approximately \$10,000; this aside from the products used by the prisoners themselves.

An interesting feature of the Houston city farm is the well ventilated "bunk house," used as sleeping quarters by the prisoners. Upon his arrival in the farm the prisoner is led into the office of the bunk house, relieved of all his clothing, and introduced to a bath of cold, chemically treated water. The clothing worn by the prisoner is taken to a building apart from the bunk house, and thoroughly fumigated. Every vestige of vermin is removed. Garments worn by the prisoner during his sojourn on the farm are furnished by the city.

A canning factory, operated as an adjunct of the city farm, provides employment for the female prisoners. Sorghum and sweet potatoes are marketed, as well as green peas. Separate accommodations keep the men and women apart, and there is no social contact whatever.

Work begins at 5:30, when the prisoners awake to the notes of a bugle. Ten minutes are set aside for the regulation "setting-up" exercises, and then all hands enjoy a breakfast which invariably includes fresh milk, eggs, vegetables raised on the farm. Work ceases at 5:30 p. m., and the prisoners spend the evening as they see fit. Ample supplies of reading matter are kept on hand, and the morals of the men are always improved after a 30 or 60 day visit to the farm.

The buildings on the city farm of Houston have been erected at a cost of \$15,153.50, and are designed with an idea of permanency. Other equipment including farm implements, live stock, fencing, teams, etc., brings the total investments, exclusive of land, up to \$23,765.91. It is estimated that the average cost of prisoner per month is \$18.60, this including groceries, meat, feed for live stock, salaries of superintendent, assistants and matrons, and incidentals.
