American Indians May Be Lost Tribes

Berkeley, Calif., March 31.—(United Press)—The theory that the American Indians are members of the lost tribe of Israel was given added proof here today when Dr. E. W. Gifford of California University's anthropology department announced his discovery of similar rites and practices between the Kawaiisu Indians of the Kern River section and the ancient Hebrews.

The Hebrews, according to the Bible, held that if a man died without offspring his brother should marry the widow and the first born of that union should be known as the dead man's child. The Kawaiisu Indians observe the same custom.

President W. V. Conner presiding, the meeting was opened to the discussion of various business matters. A motion was made that a bouquet of flowers be sent to County Supt. A. E. Ivanhoe, who was unable to attend the meeting because of an accident last evening; the motion was accepted and the flowers were sent with best regards of all who were present.

WELLS COMPELLED TO KILL ANOTHER CALF

Elgin, March 31.—(Special)—The Elgin Recorder says: L. A. Wells, Gordon creek rancher, was compelled to kill another calf last week as the result of a mad coyote getting into his barnyard several weeks ago, the account of which appeared shortly thereafter. At the time he killed the other calf he had fears that the latest victim would become afflicted with rabies as a result of being in contact with the first. At that time he observed froth on the side of the calf, which had come from the mouth of the afflicted one. He immediately secured a pan of hot water and washed it off, but the water was apparently too hot and while in the act of washing the yearling turned its head and started licking its side. Apparently it secured sufficient of the frothy slobber to get the infection and in exactly 21 days gave plain indications of rabies. Mr. Wells kept the animal in a separate pen, which together with the fact that he immediately killed it, insures that his other stock will probably escape.

African Giants.

There are many giants in Africa nine feet high. Some of them weigh 300 pounds and are strong enough to kill a panther at one blow. Perhaps you think such of fellow must be clumsy but they are not. They can run faster than any horse, springing twelve to fourteen feet at a leap. All this sounds like a fairy story, but not so when you hear that these African giants are—ostriches.

Save The Cranes And Rail Birds.

Two North American birds that are in great immediate need of protection are the white crane and his distant cousin, the Carolina rail or sora. The former, once a denizen of the western prairies, is almost extinct, and the sandhill crane seems in danger. The Carolina rail is in great demand as a table delicacy.—Exchange

The first Oregon wool of the 1917 clip was shipped from Echo to Boston, Wednesday. The regular shearing season will begin April 10.

The district attorney of Clackamas county is swamped with liquor cases, and more are coming every day.

Eight pupils were expelled from the Sumpter public schools Wednesday, because on instruction from their parents, they refused to salute the flag.

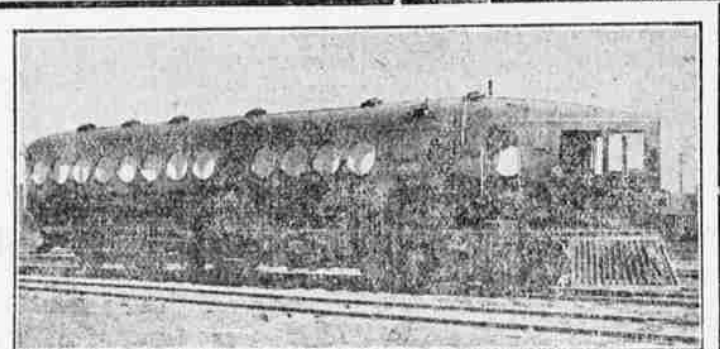
Eighteen Pendleton boys left for Idaho Wednesday to join the militia of that state.

Compressed Air Pressure.

The highest known pressure to which air has been compressed is 4,000 atmospheres (about 60,000 pounds) per square inch, but this was a laboratory experiment. The safe limit of pressure for use in the arts today is largely determined by the strength of the retaining vessel, or 3,000 pounds per square inch. To obtain these great pressures especially designed air compressors have to be constructed.
