Sporting News

BOWIE TRACK HAS MORE HORSES THAN STALLS FOR MEET TODAY

Baltimore, Md., April 2.—More than 700 thoroughbreds are on hand to take part in the two weeks' spring racing program which begins today at the Bowie track here, and although 200 new stalls have been built to replace the ones destroyed last fall by fire, there still is an insufficient number. The Southern Maryland Agricultural association, which operates the Bowie track, is placing horses everywhere possible.

The meet opening today will continue through two weeks, ending on April 14. The Jockey Club's season at Prince George's track, which is about midway between Washington and Baltimore, is opened and closed by the Maryland association.

The track at Bowie is an ideal one for early and late racing, although it is not favored as a fast stretch. The track is so built and is constructed of such earth that it quickly absorbs the heaviest rainfall. Very few disappointing races are staged.

Some of the most prominent horsemen of the country have sent steeds here for the opening events. Thoroughbreds of all ages are quartered.

New York. The winter track performers who have been at Tia Juana, Juarez, New Orleans, and Havana have sent many additions to horses which spent the winter in the north. About half those who worked through the cold months will be starters at some time during the meet.

Good Shortstops Have Got to Make Errors

"You can't be a good shortstop unless you make errors!" says C. H. Claudy in the April Woman's Home Companion.

"Think a minute, and you will understand this apparently surprising statement. Many an error, in the error column, saves a score in the score column! Thus, the ball you try for may be just too fast for you to catch. Yet you may get enough hands on it to knock it down. The runner is safe. But if you hadn't knocked it down, he might be safe on second! Of course, not all such knock-downs will be scored as errors. The point is, you can't afford to give any thought to whether you are going to make an error or not."

Shun "Tips" if You Play Stocks

"Whatever you do, don't go it alone," is the advice that Harold Howland gives to women investors in the April Woman's Home Companion. "Shun the financial gossip of the unformed, the cock-sure counsel of the irresponsible, the glittering generalities of the conceited ignoramus. Beware of rumors, 'tips,' and 'inside information.' Base your transactions upon the firm ground of accurate information, sound judgment and disinterested advice. Don't try to 'get rich quick.'"

Argentine Wants Peace Without Victory. Supports Carranza Plan

Mexican Chief's Proposal That Neutral Countries Cut Off Supplies From Belligerents Has Many Supporters—United States Ability To Build Up Merchant Marine Is Doubted.

Buenos Aires, March 5.—(By mail)—Gen Carranza's proposal that the neutral countries cut off supplies from the belligerent nations unless the latter make peace terms has many supporters in official circles here.

The officials who favor the Mexican first chief's plan say they do not believe it was dictated to him by the Germans. Even so, however, they declare they want to see peace restored and do not particularly care whether this is accomplished by pro-German,

by pro-ally or by entirely neutral influence.

A large South American element objects to an out-and-out victory by either of the European groups. The view is that South America will suffer if either side should gain a complete monopoly of South American trade.

The suggestion that the United States would furnish competition in either case is held to be a distant prospect on the ground that it will take the United States some time to build up an adequate mercantile marine if she ever does.

The Practical Garage

"The size of the garage depends upon the size of the car it is to be used for," says C. H. Claudy in the April Woman's Home Companion. "A convenient size for most cars is fourteen by eighteen feet. This will give plenty of room to work around the car. Shelf room is essential, and should be all along one side, seven feet high and one foot wide; on the other side have plenty of nails for hanging things on. At the rear end, above the door, have a shelf wide enough to hold spare outer tires. At each rear corner have a three-cornered closet for old clothing, etc. At the front corners have several three-cornered shelves set in."

"A workbench is an essential feature. This should be built near a window, so that there will be abundance of light. Make the workbench of two-inch boards, and have it as large as space will permit. Do not have the supports, or legs, come down straight to the floor, as they will be in the way, but slant them back to the wall. Make drawers to slide under the bench for holding nails, tools, etc. A tool chest of common and useful tools under the bench is a good friend. Have two electric light extensions, also a hand electric searchlight.

"A life-saving equipment is a length of garden hose that will fit over the exhaust pipe of your engine. When the engine is running, with doors and windows shut, fit one end of the hose over the exhaust pipe and put the other end outside through a hole previously made for that purpose. This may prevent you from being asphyxiated, as the gas from the exhaust is very poisonous and has been known to cause death."

The Tragedy of Being Dull

In the April Woman's Home Companion, Arnold Bennett describes the tragedy of being dull.

"The man lacking imagination is the utterly matter of fact man. He is necessarily the man who never has, and cannot have, any point of view except his own. He is the Wordsworthian man to whom a primrose by the river's brim was strictly a yellow primrose instead of being a miracle. He is imprisoned in what to him is the actual, and he is always the exact center of the prison, which is of thickest iron. His tragedy is that he does not suspect, and is incapable of suspecting, that he is in a prison at all, and that the prison walls and floor and roof entirely prevent him from really 'getting at' any other human being whatsoever. He is always in his own place, and never in the other person's place. This is the deep meaning of dullness, and this is the dull man's doom."

Work On Locks To Start

Oregon City, Ore., April 2.—The reconstruction of the government locks here will be renewed April 8. Material for the temporary flumes, the concrete dividing well and other improvements already is on the ground. Federal engineers have laid their plans so that after temporary flumes are completed, the Willamette will not be closed to river boats.

La Touraine Arrives Safely.

New York, April 2.—(Special)—The French steamer La Touraine, which left an American port March 17, has arrived safely at a French port, according to advices to the offices of the company here today. La Touraine carried 31 first cabin passengers, five second cabin passengers and 48 steerage passengers.
