It is getting to be a praiseworthy practice to thus cheer the shut-ins and feeble with attentions of this kind instead of waiting until their friends are gone from them. Fraternalism thus takes on a deeper meaning.

All of the Federal employees in La Grande and vicinity have received instructions to aid the secret service in the detection of spies and the apprehension of persons engaged in unlawful plots or intrigues against the interests of the United States. The police force has also been asked to cooperate so have the postmasters and rural letter carriers. The government will also welcome the aid of private citizens.

The state law does not permit of insults to the flag of the United States. The law says: Any person or persons who shall publicly mutilate, trample upon, deface, defile, or cast contempt upon by word or act, any such flag, color or ensign of the United States, shall be punishable by a fine of not less than twenty dollars nor more than one hundred dollars. Any violations of this law should be reported to the District Attorney.

Pioneer of 1864 Passes at Union

W. T. CARROLL EARLY RESIDENT
OF UNION IS DEAD.

Had Been Resident of Eugene Since
1895—Had Been Stricken With
Paralysis.

Eugene, April 2.—(Special)—W. T. Carroll, a pioneer of Oregon and a resident of Eugene since 1895, died at his home at 236 Thirteenth avenue east at 6 o'clock Friday morning at the age of 72 years. Paralysis was the cause of death.

Mr. Carroll came to Oregon in 1864, first settling at Union, Union county. For many years he was connected with the office of the sheriff there and in the early days experienced many exciting encounters. He came to this city with his family to enjoy the educational facilities afforded here and resided here until his death.

Mrs. Carroll and the following children survive: Walter T. Carroll, of Eugene; Mrs. John F. Bovard and Miss Cleome Carroll, of Eugene.

Teh funeral was held at the Branstetter and McLaughlin chapel yesterday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock and the remains were placed in Hope Abbey mausoleum.

Canyon City Is Booming.

Canyon City, April 2.—(Special)—Canyon City is humming these days as in the former times, when gold prospecting attracted hundreds of miners to this section. The usual sight these days is a party of from three to a dozen prospectors starting out to the nearby mountains. The cause of the activity is the increased price of chrome iron ore, which now brings \$22 a ton at Prairie City. Up to a few weeks ago \$7 a ton was paid, and with hauling charges high the profit was no profit except from chrome deposits within a few miles of the shipping point. It is now being hauled as far as 35 miles at a profit.
