Death of Mrs. Sarah M. Graham Last Night

Former Member of the Observer Staff and Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Budge Passes Away After Lingering Illness.

Mrs. Sarah M. (Syd) Graham died at the home of her parents, Engineer and Mrs. Thomas Budge, 1305 N avenue at 10 o'clock last evening after a lingering illness, brought on by Bright's disease. The funeral will be held Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Presbyterian church, in which institution she was an active member. Mrs. Graham had been sinking rapidly the past few days, and the end came peacefully last night with the relatives about the death bed. In addition to the sorrowing parents, a sister, Mrs. Lillie Galloway, and a nephew, Walter Galloway, survive to mourn the death of a sterling woman.

Mrs. Graham was born in Galesburg, Illinois, March 7th, 1881. When still quite young her parents moved to La Grande and it was here that the deceased achieved distinction as a compositor. She first began to work in the Observer office as an apprentice typesetter, but rapidly forged ahead in her profession at the time Curry Brothers owned the Observer and at a time when linotypes were not in vogue here. She became unusually proficient—her accuracy and speed at composition were nothing short of wonderful and she frequently did the work of two ordinary girls. When the linotypes eventually displaced her profession she learned the "make up" phase of printing and under the editorship of Bruce Dennis she became unusual adept at that part of the printing trade. Few men have equalled her in the science of making up a paper. During the 18 years of service in a printing office she came to know all angles of the profession—even unto the linotypes.

Her conscientious service with the Observer will always be memory gem to the various proprietors and employees under whom and with whom she has worked. Two years ago she was not well much of the time and only occasionally appeared at her post in the Observer.

Former editors and fellow printers will officiate as pallbearers at the funeral.

Syd, the name by which she was familiarly known, was a warm friend, a true woman—in fact possessed of all the virtues that go to make a model citizen of a community. The Observer force shares a part of the sorrow the demise has occasioned, and extends to the bereaved relatives heartfelt sympathies in the hour of darkness for her smile will no more brighten the lives of her friends and acquaintances.

disrespect.

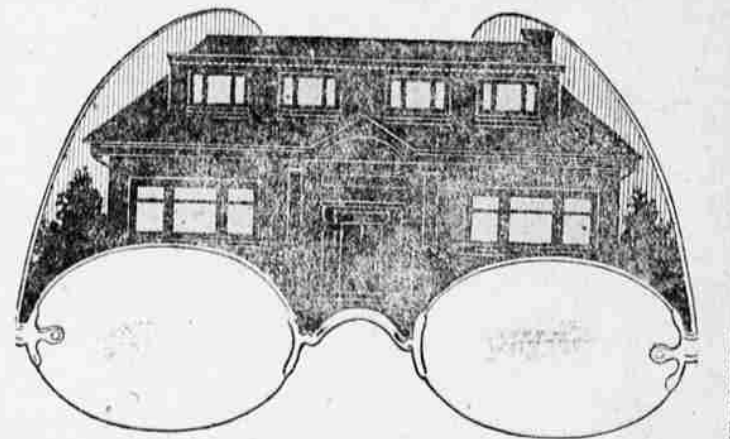
2. I solemnly pledge loyalty and good fellowship toward all members of The Girls' National Honor Guard regardless of their creed or station, and I will faithfully stand by each member, giving whatever aid and encouragement within my power in times of need.

3. I fully realize that this Organization does not allow in any form whatsoever slander, malicious or unjust criticism, hypocrisy, disloyalty or pretentiousness; that any word or action detrimental to the principles of the Honor Guard shall be considered a grave offense, and by so doing I forfeit my Honor Guard Badge, and at the same time acknowledge the rightful authority of the Officers of the Guard to suspend me from any duties until my appeal is decided upon by the National Headquarters.

4. Furthermore, I solemnly pledge to show respect to The Star-Spangled Banner, the National Air, and will memorize each verse. I will in no way allow the American Flag to be desecrated in my presence without protest. I realize it must never touch the ground, never remain lying after sun-down, never be raised stars downward unless as a signal of distress, never be raised half-mast unless indicative of National mourning.

5. I further realize that The Girls' National Honor Guard stands for high ideals, a principle of loyal patriotism, a trust given into the hands of American girls, and I earnestly promise with all understanding of the seriousness of this covenant to observe the obligations and duties of The Girls' National Honor Guard as a sacred confidence, remembering our motto, "Our Trust We Guard." Respectfully and earnestly I subscribe my hand to the above.
