La Grande, Oregon, April 3, 1917.—(To the General Public)—I have just learned it has been reported that I expressed a wish that if war was declared, the President would be shot, and that I would give \$50 to the person firing the shot. Any statement that I made any remark that would justify such report is absolutely and unqualifiedly false. I have been a naturalized citizen of this country ever since 1895, and am as devoted to its government and institutions as if born here. Where the war was confined to Germany and the European countries, I favored my native country; but will support this country against any foe, and my property and services are at the command of my adopted country at this time.
