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WHY A SILO?

Do you want to know more about silos and the advantages of feeding silage? If so you will have an opportunity to hear Prof. W. A. Barr, of the O. A. C. Extension Service, who will address a series of silo meetings to be held at different places in this county, April 12 to 14. Prof. Barr has had experience in building scores of silos of many different types and today is generally considered to be the best authority on silos in Oregon.

The 15 silos used in Union County the past winter have proved beyond a doubt their value and practicability for this country. These 15 silo owners are all enthusiastic in their praise of the silo and many consider the saving in feed effected the past winter alone, of sufficient value to pay for their silo.

Every farmer engaged in feeding stock of any kind should be interested in silos. They are no longer an experiment, last fall six different kinds of crops were successfully used in silos of this county. F. W. Kehrli, Dairy Specialist for Eastern Oregon, will also be present to discuss some of the results of the past season.

SQUIRRELS

The common ground squirrels of Union County, along with the red squirrels near the timber sections, cause considerable loss each year to the farmers of this county. The U. S. Biological Survey has been doing a lot of effective work in determining methods of controlling these pests; and they have made it possible to have Mr. R. A. Ward be with us for a short time to demonstrate the proper methods of mixing squirrel poisons that have been worked out by the bureau. Mr. Ward has been doing very effective work in organizing farmers of various communities to fight these pests in Klamath, Jackson, Josephine, Sherman, and Wasco counties. PROHIBITION DEFEATED.

Victoria, B. C., April 4.—(United Press)—Prohibition was defeated in British Columbia by a margin of about 800, and equal suffrage by a margin even larger, according to the best information available here today. Although the election was held some time ago the vote from the trenches in Europe is just being received. British Columbia soldiers voted against prohibition and suffrage.

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
