Re-seeding at Athena.
Pendleton, April 5.—(Special)—Fully fifty per cent of the wheat land about Athena that was seeded last fall will have to be re-seeded this spring, according to Mayor Homer L. Watts of Athena who was here yesterday afternoon. Other farmers of

that locality place the percentage as high as seventy.
