Obituary of O. W. Moon

Oscar W. Moon, familiarly known among his friends as "Dad" Moon, was born August 30th, 1841, in Monroe county, Pennsylvania. He spent his boyhood days on a farm and in the spring of 1861 secured employment as a brakemen on the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western railroad, serving in that capacity about one year. In May 1862 he quit the train service and obtained a position as fireman on the Erie railroad, running between Hornellsville, N. Y., and Susquehanna, Penn. In 1867 he was promoted to engineer and served in that capacity until 1882. In that year he came west and at once found employment on the Oregon Railroad & Navigation Co. line running between The Dalles and Wallula. When the railroad was extended eastward from Umatilla over the mountains he was one of the first engineers employed on the construction trains on that work. When the road reached La Grande he brought the first train that came in here at that time. It is interesting to note that in connection with this pioneer work was also associated our present county treasurer, John Frawley, he being the conductor in charge of the first train into the valley. Mr. Moon served as engineer on the main line until soon after completion of the Elgin branch when he took a run between Elgin and La Grande. When the branch line was built from Pendleton to Pilot Rock he was assigned to that run where he served until his retirement from active service August 30, 1911. Having reached the age limit at the latter date and being entitled to a pension from the company he had so long served he retired to his home in La Grande where he remained until about two years ago when he was taken to the State hospital on account of the infirmities of age. Mr. Moon became a member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers in 1868, Division No. 47 at Hornellsville, N. Y. When he came to the O-W. P. & N. he transferred his membership to the

Division at The Dalles and later becoming a charter member of Division No. 362 located at La Grande. He served as Chief of this Division for ten years and was a delegate to the National conventions at Denver, Pittsburgh and St. Louis. He also served in other offices in his local Division.

Mr. Moon's first wife died in 1904; later he was again married, his second wife surviving him at his death which occurred April 4, 1917.

The funeral services were conducted at the Baptist church at 2 p. m. today, Rev. J. J. Tickner officiating.
