Little Band of Americans In The Balkans See The Horrors of War

Fifty-Five College Students Are Driving Cars For American Ambulance Corps—Robert Montgomery Is Wounded By Shell Which Killed a Little Child.

Paris, March 16.—(By Mail)—Many times a day the little band of 55 American college students driving cars for the American Ambulance in the Balkans get their fill of the horrors of war. Ennis Brown of Charleston, S. C., the first of the 55 to return, is here today. He told the story of Robert Montgomery, a Princeton boy from New York City, the only one of the company wounded up to the time he left on his way back to America. "Our work is in and around Monastir," said Brown, "and mighty rough going it is. Over perilous mountain passes and over country no man would think of travelling in peace time. Shelling of our territory by the big German guns is ceaseless. Even in the town we are constantly

and observation it was not safe for even a small Ford ambulance to move through Monastir's crooked streets. Shells would drop just behind our cars as they passed along, the range at times so exact that the explosions would follow the curves and corners. The persistent shelling of Monastir finally made it too unhealthy for the American ambulances there. It was necessary to hide the cars in narrow streets and never allow them to be seen in the open squares. The ambulance base was therefore moved to Negotani, south of Monastir, from where we worked, always at night, bringing the wounded back to the base hospitals from the front lines."

PROTECTING THE NEWS.

The International News Service, a Hearst organization, whose medium of dissemination in Portland is the Oregon Journal, was restrained last Thursday, through injunction issued in the Federal District Court of New York, from pilfering Associated Press news dispatches prior to their publication by newspapers which are members of the Associated Press and which pay for the dispatches and are entitled to them. Another branch of the case, a petition that the International News Service be restrained from appropriating Associated Press news from early editions of Associated Press newspapers and selling it to other papers, was left open for future decision, but up to this branch also the court declared the preliminary ex-judicial opinion that: " \* \* \* the right exists to prevent the sale by a competing news agency of news which is taken from early publication of complainant's member before a sufficient time has elapsed to afford opportunity for general publication, and the existing practice amount to unfair trade." The International News Service had secretly employed a telegraph editor of a Cleveland, O., newspaper receiving the Associated Press service to furnish it (the International News Service) by telephone instantly upon receipt with the text or substance of important dispatches sent to its members by the Associated Press. It was shown and proved to the court that numerous items of importance had thus been pilfered, delivered to the International News Service and published in newspapers served by that organization simultaneously with their publication in Associated Press newspapers which were entitled to them. This is the form of news thievery which the International News Service has been restrained by court injunction from continuing. It requires but a statement of the facts to disclose the unethical, not to say felonious, character of the International's news methods. It is notorious that the whole structure of its service is built up largely in this way. It is a parasitic organization which thrives upon the enterprise of others. It pilfers real news where it can and often resorts to fakery of the baldest sort. The most recent instance of this latter form of activity was exemplified in Portland last Friday night, when the Journal carried in its night edition with the greatest possible display a story saying a fleet of German submarines had been captured by United States naval vessels off Hayti. There was not a scintilla of truth in the story, which, needless to say, was carried as an International News Ser-
