EASTERN OREGON PIONEER PASSES IN WALLA WALLA

HENRY RINEHART CALLED AFTER LONG LIFE SPENT IN THE GRANDE RONDE VALLEY.

Henry Rinehart, a native of Illinois and an Eastern Oregon pioneer, passed away Sunday morning, at his home on Pleasant street in Walla Walla, following an illness of several weeks. He was 75 years of age, and had lived in the Pacific Northwest since 1854.

Henry Rinehart was born in Adams county, Illinois, in 1842. In 1845 he moved with his parents to Iowa, and in 1854, at the age of 12 years, moved across the plains with his parents by ox team, settling in Lane county, Oregon, after a trip of six months and four days.

He grew to manhood on his father's old donation claim, and later, striking out for himself, went to Walla Walla, where he spent one year in the shingle business. The following year, 1862, he left for the Grand Ronde valley and was one of those that made the rush to open the Auburn mines in Baker county.

In the fall of 1863 he returned to Union county, and took a claim near Summerville, Oregon, planting his first crop from seed he had carried from Walla Walla. Later he engaged in the flour mill and freighting business, handling goods to the mines in Idaho. He also made several trips east with stock, driving the animals overland, via Granger, Wyoming, to Chicago.

In 1868 he was elected representative by the people of Union and Walla Walla counties. Later he returned to his farm and engaged in farming and live stock raising. In both 1868 and 1878 he saw service in the Indian uprisings.

In 1850 President Cleveland appointed him as register of the United States land office at La Grande, and after holding that position for a number of years, he returned to his home near Summerville. In 1908 he retired and moved to Walla Walla, there to spend his declining years.

In March, 1865, he was married to Margaret A. Martin, who crossed the plains with her parents in 1852. He is survived by his wife and four children, as follows: Mrs. Nellie M. Eubanks, of Walla Walla; Eugene and Frank C. Rinehart and Mrs. S. A. Chappell of Summerville.

During his residency in Walla Walla the deceased was an active member of the Presbyterian church, and for 46 years was affiliated with the A. F. & A. M.

Funeral services were held in Walla Walla after which the body was shipped to Summerville where the final funeral services were held yesterday and the body laid to rest near his old home.

GOOD ROAD SIDELIGHTS

A dollar's worth of road for a dollar's worth of expenditure is assured at the hands of the State Highway Commission which is charged with disbursing the funds raised from the proposed \$6,000,000 good roads bonds.

The question involved in the proposed issue of \$6,000,000 road bonds is simply this: Do the people of Oregon desire to approve and inaugurate a comprehensive system of state-wide highway development. If the bond issue is approved, taxes will not be increased one cent on that account. Both the principal and the interest on the bonds will be paid from the fund created by doubling the automobile license and adding thereto the quarter of a mill state road tax already provided.

In the last ten years approximately \$40,000,000 has been expended on roads in this state. What is there to show for it? Support the \$6,000,000 bond issue on June 4th and let's take up road building on a practical and comprehensive basis.

ROAD BOND ISSUE IN A NUTSHELL

Proposed Issue of \$6,000,000 for Good Roads Will Not Increase Taxes.

Authorizes State Highway Commission during next five years to issue bonds to the amount of \$6,000,000. The issue is limited to 1,000,000 in 1917 and \$2,000,000 in 1918.

Bonds are to be of serial form and beginning sixth year to be retired one-twentieth each year.

Of the bond issue at least \$600,000 must be in denominations of \$500 each or less.

Bonds shall bear 4 per cent interest payable semi-annually.

Funds derived from bond issue to be expended in paving main highways after counties have made roads ready to receive pavement.

Bill designates roads to be paved, but Highway Commission is authorized to make local changes and may also add other post and forest roads to system.

Highway Commission is to let all contracts in open and public session according to law to lowest bid.

If lowest bids deemed excessive Highway Commission is authorized to reject all bids and do work itself, being empowered to purchase necessary equipment.

Proposed bonds will not increase taxes. Increased automobile license and existing one-fourth mill state road tax will pay interest and retire bonds at maturity.

will not farm and of how Chinese and Japanese are capturing prizes in our own American universities against our own students.

Lieutenant Allen spoke on behalf of the officers and men of Company M and expressed their appreciation of La Grande's hospitality. He was applauded when he said that he had news that the Third Oregon was now only 50 men short of war strength. He said that the war brought duties and responsibilities upon every one as well as the ones who went to the front. He urged moderation and forbearance in speech and actions so that communities would not be stirred up with bitterness and strife, and expressed the belief that the foreign-born citizens would be found to be doing their full duty without hesitation.

Bishop Paddock spoke on patriotism and he made a masterly oration. He showed how the war had come on Great Britain, unprepared, slothful and inefficient, steeped in liquor and vice; how France had been gay and pleasure-loving and addicted to absinthe; how Russia had been bound in superstition and ignorance. Patriotism, self preservation had removed them from their barracks, and the war had proved their salvation. It had helped them to find their souls.

"The war," said Bishop Paddock, "is a war between democracy and autocracy, between the right of a people to govern themselves and Kaiserism. Just as we fought our fathers and brothers in the Revolution, and as we fought our brothers in the Civil war for principle, so we are asking nothing unreasonable in asking our foreign born citizens to fight for what we fought for before democracy and liberty."

Bishop Paddock pictured America before the war, slothful and rich, full of money-making, resting secure while Belgium, France and Great Britain protected us from the German invasion.

"This should be a war for principle, not for resentment, because a foreign nation plotted against us, even to the extent of trying to deprive us of territory, but a war to establish democracy."

He said we should all search our hearts to see whether our patriotism really was there and whether it would drive us, not to die for our country, but to live for it in the right, and most dutiful way.

PRACTICAL PATRIOTISM.
