## BIG EXCURSION TRAIN IS COMING FROM PENDLETON

Several Hundred Moose and Friends Coming from Pendleton Tomorrow in Special Train.

La Grande will turn out tomorrow to welcome the Moose special train coming from Pendleton which will bring, it is predicted, several hundred citizens, Moose and buckaroos from the Round-up town, to participate in the big Moose festival tomorrow night. This special train will leave Pendleton tomorrow at 1:30 p. m. and will arrive at La Grande at 4 p. m. and will be out to welcome the visitors and it is hoped and expected that La Grande will turn out en masse to welcome our neighbors from Pendleton.

The occasion for this big special excursion is a celebration by the Moose in honor of the closing of the charter. A large class of candidates will be initiated at the Moose lodge in this city and the degree team of the Pendleton lodge will assist the candidates to cross the "Burning sands."

The program for tomorrow will be somewhat as follows:

The special train will arrive at about 4 p. m., and the band and the local members of the Moose lodge and the citizens and businessmen of La Grande will turn out to welcome them.

At 6 p. m. a banquet will be served at the Foley hotel which will be open

to all Moose. All Moose are requested to be present at this banquet on a dare requested to give their names to George Young, "Daddy" Burt or Foley hotel. After the banquet at the Foley the lodge will take up the initiation work at the hall at 7 o'clock. Any candidates who have not been examined as yet may be examined at the hall by physicians who will be present. After the initiation, a dance which will begin at about 9 p. m. will be held at the hall, for members, their friends, and the public are also invited to attend this dance.

## PATRIOTISM AT HOME.

Cullough gave a splendid talk on the patriotism of the schools, industrial preparedness, advising parents to encourage their children to take every advantage of this work especially of gardening. He made an appeal to those present for an enlargement in the industrial plant of the high school, adding an additional building, so that all phases of this work could be successfully handled and that mechanical training be given the local boys so that upon finishing their school work they will be fitted for work in shops without serving apprenticeship.

Mr. Mason, manual training instructor of the La Grande high school, followed Mr. McCullough's speech by telling of the excellent work done by the boys of the school and giving all an invitation to come to the high school and view the work turned out. Mr. L. P. Harrington from State Superintendent Churchill's office, delivered an address on this work among the boys and girls of Oregon. He gave excellent illustrations of the interest the business men as a whole were taking in the coming generations, showing the closer relation of the public with the schools, through the good work of the Parent-Teachers' association. He commended La Grande schools upon their thrift stating upon visiting the schools that two-thirds of all pupils in grades had bank accounts.

He considers the work of the children in producing the food products of which we are in actual need is one of the greatest deeds of patriotism, saying that the little fellows can defend their homes through their efforts in this work just as their fathers and big brothers can by actual service at the front during the coming strife.

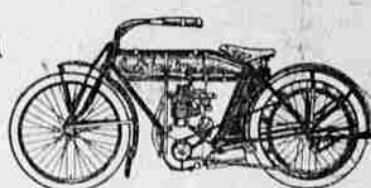
