Mrs. Lucinda Low died of paralysis at the home of her son William Henry at 8 o'clock Sunday morning about six miles south of Telocaset.

Lucinda Foster was born at Haysville, Ohio, Sept. 23, 1826. Her folks moved to Michigan when she was 12 years of age and later moved to Elkheart, Indiana, where she was married to Edward Low in 1846. In 1858 they moved to Iowa and came to Union County in 1864 where they have resided since. Five children were born to them, four whom are living, George at Ashland, Ore., Albert at Los Angeles, Calif., Mrs. Mary Wilkes at Wenatche, Wash., and William Henry at Telocaset. There are twenty grandchildren and twenty-nine great grandchildren living. Interment took place at Union Tuesday.
