Reports of City Manager for Week

Two Fires Reported—No Arrests—Engineer Sets Grades—Payments of Delinquent Assessments More Rapid.

The city manager's report follows: The fire chief reports two fires for the week, one at the Grande Ronde Meat Co. on Adams avenue which was of no consequence. Nine volunteers responded. The other was at the Standard Laundry. This might have been quite a fire had it not been detected in time. Damage was about \$25. Eleven volunteers responded here. Mr. Jesse Stiles has taken the place of Fireman Roe who resigned last week.

Chief of police reports no arrests for the week. Number of meals served, 18. One special officer used Saturday night. Light out on Adams and Elm one night.

Street superintendent reports an expenditure of \$161.69; \$98.57 for teams and drivers; \$63.12 for single hands. Have scraped and hauled extra dirt off of North Second and North Fir and East Adams; also made repairs at levee on river and cleaned out culverts on South Fourth; have also cleaned rubbish from hitching racks on Jefferson.

Water superintendent shows an expenditure for week of \$48.00; \$15.00 of this was on cost of pumping septic tank; \$13.75 for cleaning out sewers; \$11.00 for making two taps; \$2.75 for lowering pipe to prevent future freezing.

Engineer's report for the week shows that he has set grade for George Lyman north of shops. Grade and line for Hilton on East Adams. Street line for parking at 1902 Q avenue. Located city limits in the neighborhood of Robert's Deal's place, Old Town. Corrected error of former surveys and located boundary lines in Riverside addition and established city grades for viaduct.

Caretaker at intake reports slight thaw and we are able to get sufficient water from Beaver creek to maintain city demands. We are again able to furnish O. W. R. & N. with water. Caretaker reports 11 inches snow Monday, April 16. I have found it necessary to cut hole in top of septic tank in order to reach wall of solid sand. Think in few days pumping will finish work there.

Have instructed chief of police to put dog catcher and pound master at work; have had an ordinance prepared governing regulation of dance halls. This was necessary in order to give police sufficient power to correct evils which might occur.

City treasurer reports that about one-half of the warrants called have been offered for redemption. Payment of delinquent assessments for the week has been better than usual.

I have sold two small bonds to private parties in Portland. Have completed work of laying Second street sewer under viaduct. Have had men go over some of the grades on road to Beaver creek; make small drainage ditches to keep grade from washing out. Have instructed street superintendent to notify property owners to make necessary repairs on sidewalks; also have instructed him to make active campaign as to cleaning alleys and the removal of manure piles and garbage which have accumulated during winter.

CITY COMMISSION TO REGULATE DANCE HALLS.

At the meeting of the City Commission last evening a new ordinance was introduced regulating dance halls and giving power to the municipal judge to close dance halls and to revoke licenses.

Death of a Grande Ronde Pioneer.

Imbler, April 19.—(Special)—William Martin Bennett was born in the state of Indiana, June 14, 1838.

He emigrated to the state of Oregon in 1860, at the age of 22, and four years later was united in marriage to Eliza W. Bird. To this union were born 10 children, eight of whom survive to mourn his loss. Mr. Bennett was a pioneer of Oregon coming here when the state was first being settled and during the last 45 or 50 years he has been in the Grande Ronde valley engaged in stock raising and general farming. For several years past the deceased has been in poor health and lately has made his home in Elgin. His death came rather unexpectedly last Sunday evening and on Monday the body was shipped to Imbler, where his daughter, Mrs. Parilla Keifer, resides, but was not taken to the home on account of the serious illness of Mrs. Keifer's son, Albert. Tuesday morning after a short service, the deceased was taken to the Sumnerville cemetery and laid in its final resting place.

German Governor of Belgium Is Dead.
