Certain Limits to Dogs Privileges. City Manager Currey announced today that there seems to be a misunderstanding relative to the privileges granted dogs which may be adorned with city tax tags. He wants it understood that this tag does not grant free license to the dogs to roam at will over the city.

Citizens who are attempting to increase the food supply by intensive gardening should not be handicapped by destroying angles in the form of over-active canines, and to prevent this the police department will assume that dogs must be kept up or the owners will be held responsible for damage caused from trespass on the part of their dogs whether they are licensed or not.

No general relaxation of requirements, however, is said to be contemplated.
