**Served in Two Wars.** New Westminster, B. C., April 20.—(United Press)—With a record of distinguished military service in two wars, Private A. Collins has come back home. He is the proud possessor of the distinguished service medal, won in the South African war, and of the Medaille Militaire, presented to him by the French government for his service on the western front. The price of honor has been high, however, for Private Collins never again will be able to fight under the flag of the dominion. He received a wound in the hip, and shrapnel hit him in the eye.

**CATTLE AND HORSE RAISERS' ASSOCIATION OF OREGON SCORES ANOTHER VICTORY** Burns, Ore., April 20.—(Special)—Malheur and Harney counties are so sparsely settled that cattle and horse thieves have, for many years been very active in their depredations in those counties. The thieves have not worked individually but in bands, nor have they devoted their time to the theft of single animals but instead have worked in relays and stolen many at one time. So many persons, including some of considerable prominence have been involved that the courts have found it practically impossible to secure a conviction, though many cases have been tried. In 1916 more than 80 head of cattle were found that had been stolen and the original brands changed. The grand jury in Harney county found numerous indictments, and four attorneys assisted in the prosecutions, but only secured one conviction. Later, a number of indictments were found in Malheur county, but upon a trial of the cases they all resulted in a verdict of acquittal.

In this number of cattle upon which the brands had been changed there were two or three steers that belonged to William Jones, president of the First Bank of Juntura. Mr. Jones is a member of the Cattle and Horse Raisers' association of Oregon, and applied to this association for assistance in the prosecution of the band of range rustlers, and thereafter the owners of the other steers that were stolen also became members of the Cattle and Horse Raisers' association of Oregon. This association recently secured the services of Judge Morton D. Clifford and Senator W. H. Strayer, two of the best criminal prosecutors in the state, and sent them to Burns to conduct the prosecution of B. H. Seward, the ring leader of the band range rustlers, being one of the same parties who had been tried in both Harney and Malheur counties and acquitted. Seward offered a plea of former acquittal. This case was tried by Clifford and Strayer. More than thirty witnesses being examined, and resulted in the verdict for the State of Oregon. B. H. Seward then confessed and made a clear breast of the entire proceeding, implicating a number of residents of Harney and Malheur counties. The following day he pleaded guilty to the larceny of cattle and was sentenced to the Oregon penitentiary. The grand jury of Harney county immediately reconvened and doubtless many indictments were made as a result of B. H. Seward's confession. B. H. Seward and his brothers own a ranch in Barren valley and his father, J. H. Seward is quite a prominent man in Eastern Oregon and a resident of Ontario. The cattle and horse growers of Harney and Malheur counties are greatly elated over this victory, and believe that wholesale range rustling is a thing of the past. One of the chief objects of the Cattle and Horse Raisers' association of Oregon is to break up the larceny of livestock on the public range. This association has assisted in the prosecution of a large number of alleged thefts and has secured a conviction in every instance.

Big Patriotic Demonstration. Portland, Ore., April 20.—(United Press)—Twenty thousand persons, representing practically every lodge and civic organization in the city, marched last night in the biggest patriotic demonstration in the history of the Pacific northwest. One of the features of the demonstration—a feature unannounced and surprising—was the evident appearance of President Wilson in the parade. H. D. Coale, a perfect double of the president, accompanied by a military guard and attired in Prince Albert coat and stiff hat led the parade.
