HOW TO RESPECT THE FLAG.

Whenever the National Anthem is played at any place when persons belonging to the military service are present, all officers and enlisted men not in formation shall stand at attention facing toward the music (except at retreat, when they shall face toward the flag). If in uniform, covered or uncovered, or in civilian clothes, uncovered, they shall salute at the first note of the anthem, remaining in the position of salute until the last note of the anthem. If not in uniform and covered, they shall uncover

at the first note of the anthem, holding the headdress opposite the left shoulder and so remain until its close, except that in inclement weather the headdress may be slightly raised.

The same rules apply when to the color or to the standard is sounded as when the National Anthem is played. When played by an Army band, the National Anthem shall be played through without repetition of any part not required to be repeated to make it complete.

The same marks of respect prescribed for observance during the playing of the National Anthem of the United States shall be shown toward the National Anthem of any other country when played upon official occasions. 4-19-31.

SEARCHING OUT GERMAN NAVAL BASE IN BRAZIL

Rio De Janeiro, April 19.—(United Press)—After numberless rumors and unconfirmed reports regarding naval bases said to have been established by German raiders and submarines on the coast of Brazil, what appears to be a reliable story of such a base has reached this city. The story is vouched for by Colonel Jose Maria da Silva, proprietor of a large plantation on the Ilha de Maraca, which is said to have been the rendezvous of several German ships at various times since the beginning of the war.

The Ilha de Macara is separated from the northern coast of Brazil by the Carrapaparis Channel. Three German warships anchored in this channel for several days during the first year of the war, and have used

the hiding place several times since, the last time being during February this year. He declared that fresh meat was furnished the ships by several cattle raisers, that the ships took water and made repairs. Tropical jungle climb precipitous slopes of land so that ships' masts or funnels are completely obscured when the ship lies close in to shore. Colonel Silva reported that officers from the first German ships to use the hiding place embarked in gasoline launches and made careful soundings of the channel and the entire neighborhood of the island, and that they made detailed maps from their observations. With the publishing of Colonel Silva's statements the Brazilian cruiser "Tymbra" was dispatched to the scene to verify the story and protect the Brazilian neutrality. Reports indicating that the raiders are still active in the South Atlantic continue to arrive, the latest being a telegram from Belem, a city near the mouth of the Amazon, saying that a naval battle had been fought within sight of that city. The report stated that it was believed that the engagement was fought between the French cruiser "Greydon" and the German raider.

Washington, April 19.—(United Press)—From time immemorial the news censor has been "cussed" by the newspaper man. Cases when his work has been appreciated are so rare as to be well worth recording. Coast To Be Left Out.

Portland, Ore., April 20.—(United Press)—It is not likely that Pacific coast shipbuilders will be given the opportunity to build any of the first batch of submarine chasers, although shipbuilders are still making an effort to land some of the contracts, according to word received here from Washington. "The navy department recognizes Douglas fir as a suitable material for hull construction, but owing to the small size of the vessels planned, the impossibility of shipping them overland and the small cruising radius they possess, it has been deemed advisable to build at least the first batch on the Atlantic coast," reads a message received here from the navy department.

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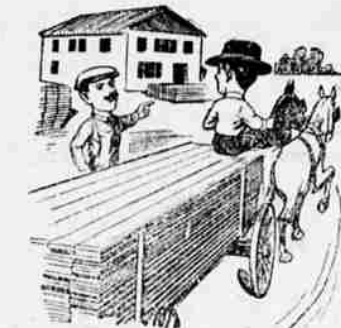
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
