UNION COUNTY FARMERS UNION HOLD CONVENTION AND OPPOSE BONDS.
Union County F. E. and C. U. of A. of Union County, Oregon, held their second quarterly county convention of the year, in La Grande on Saturday April 14, 1917.

A very interesting meeting was held. Quite a large delegation from the different locals in the county were in attendance.

At the noon hour all were invited to the dining room where the tables were laden with an abundance of those good things prepared by the good ladies of La Grande local.

After the noon hour all assembled in the hall and were called into closed session until 3 p. m. when an open meeting was held. They were then favored with a splendid talk by our worthy Senator Walter Pierce on the Road Bonds.

The meeting then adjourned to meet in Imbler on Saturday July 14, 1917.

The following resolutions were brought before the meeting and adopted by that body.

Resolution No. 1.
Whereas, a special election has been called for June 4, 1917, for the purpose of voting on the proposed \$6,000,000 state bonds to build good roads.

Therefore, be it resolved by Union county convention of F. E. and C. U. of A. in executive session at La Grande assembled April 14, 1917—That we are unalterably opposed to said bond issue. First, because it is contrary to our principles. Second, it is a bill to hard surface roads and not to build them, which looks to us like a bill in favor of the paving trust. Third, it looks to us like an entering wedge to more bonds in order that counties may get any benefit from it.

We are in favor of good roads and are willing to pay a good strong tax to build them. But let us pay for them as we build them.

Resolution No. 2.
Be it resolved, that we will give our loyal support to the administration in the present crisis, but we recommend that all caution be exercised in incit-
