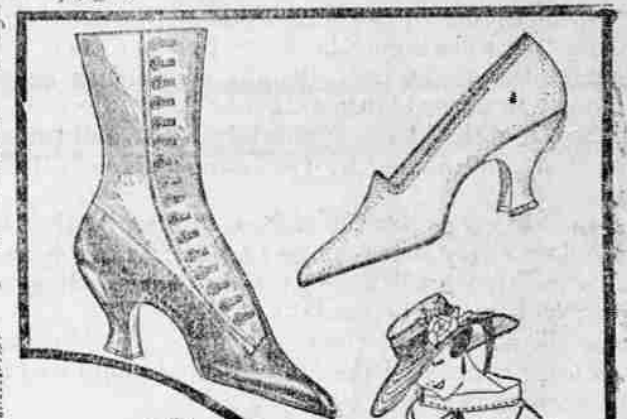
Mrs. E. P. Mossman is visiting friends in Portland this week.
