at retreat, when they shall face toward the flag). If in uniform, covered or uncovered, or in civilian clothes, uncovered, they shall salute at the first note of the anthem, retaining the position of salute until the last note of the anthem. If not in uniform and covered; they shall uncover at the first note of the anthem, holding the headress opposite the left shoulder and so remain until its close, except that in inclement weather the headress may be slightly raised.
The same rules apply when to the color or to the standard is sounded as when the National Anthem is played.
When played by an Army band, the National Anthem shall be played through without repetition of any part not required to be repeated to make it complete.
The same marks of respect prescribed for observance during the playing of the National Anthem of the United States shall be shown toward the National Anthem of any other country when played upon official occasions. 4-19-3t.

Road Enthusiasts United.
Senator Julien Hurley as a member of the legislative road committee is in a position to do great work for Malheur county and Eastern Oregon. His recent success in getting the Highway commission to include in its plan for state roads the extension of the road from Huntington to Ontario to connect with the post roads proposed from Bend to the Idaho line is the first step he has taken and should serve to unite the road enthusiasts of this section behind his efforts.—Ontario Argus.
One Cabbage Head's Overhead. (From the Philadelphia Evening Ledger.)
A head of cabbage cost a West Philadelphia housekeeper 34 cents. It was delivered by an automobile driven by a uniformed chauffeur and was wrapped in a fancy box. In addition to the cost of rent, light and salesmanship, the woman had to pay for gasoline, chauffeur hire and wear and tear on tires. Half of the overhead expense would be eliminated if consumers carried their own food.

The United States Civil Service Commission is making an extraordinary effort to supply the needs of the Navy Department for ship draftsmen. Millions of dollars are available for construction, but all ship-building work undertaken at government yards is retarded by a shortage of ship draftsmen. Salaries range from \$3.28 to \$6.00 and over per diem. Age limits 18 years or over. About thirty vacancies exist at the Puget Sound Navy Yard, Bremerton, Washington. Until further notice applications will be received by the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., at any time. Papers will be examined immediately upon their receipt and a rating will be assigned to the competitor. Those who are found to be qualified will be offered employment at once. Application Form 1812 and full information may be secured from the secretary, 11th Civil Service District, Seattle, Washington; or from the Local Secretary, Board of Civil Service Examiners in this city. All qualified persons not now employed on government contracts are urged to apply.
Bruce Cox, traveling salesman for the La Grande Grocery Co., was in Elgin recently.
