North Powder, Ore., April 22.—(Special)—Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Burdette, who lives a few miles out of town, received a letter from their son Robert Burdette who recently enlisted in the army. He joined the Signal Corps of the army. He expects to take up motor work and mechanical construction of flying machines. He did not know whether he would be sent to San Diego, Cal., or Fort Leavenworth. He says that they are very strict about the examination that a man has to pass before he is accepted. He has enlisted for seven years. Three of active service and four in the reserve. After six months service he will be allowed sixty days furlough. After three months work in the mechanical school he will take examination and if he passes he will be given commission as lieutenant. The signal corps is made up of skilled mechanics and tradesmen. A man can learn telegraphy both wireless and wire, telephone and motor truck work. The aviation branch is the one he has been assigned to on account of his knowledge of gas engines. The young man was at Vancouver barracks when this letter was written. Robert Burdette has lived in Cove, Ore., for several years and is a graduate of the Cove high school. His parents moved on a homestead near North Powder three years ago and Robert has been working on the ranche here since that time. The young man is well pleased with his position and his many friends wish him every success in his chosen calling.

Several tractor attachments have been ordered by the different ranchers around this section for automobiles. They will be tried out as soon as they come and they will take the place of horse power. Feed is so scarce that the farmer is trying to get something to take the place of so many horses. If they are a success and it is said that they are by those who have seen them there will be many more ordered. In fact this part of the country will have a lot of tractors. JOHN BERG HAS FINE RECORD AS WRESTLER

SPOKANE MAN WILL ENDEAVOR TO RETRIEVE DEFEAT BY THE LOCAL CHAMPION.

John Berg, 175 pound wrestler of Spokane, Wash., who will meet Jack O'Neill, the local wrestling favorite at the Arcade theatre April 25th, has a remarkable record as a wrestler. He is 39 years old, was born in Sweden and has wrestled over a thousand matches, appearing in nearly all the larger cities of this country and Europe. He has met many of the best men in the heavy weight class, including Gotch, Dr. Roller, Wm. J. Demetral, Dan McCleod, Farmer Burns, Carl Pons, Rooney, the giant gripman, and hundreds of other good men in this country and Europe.

Berg is one of the grandest specimens of manhood ever seen here and is a living picture of what physical culture, proper training and clean living will do for a man.

He is pleased to get another opportunity to try his prowess and ability against O'Neill and has written that he will be in condition to make the fight of his life to regain what he lost where here last.
