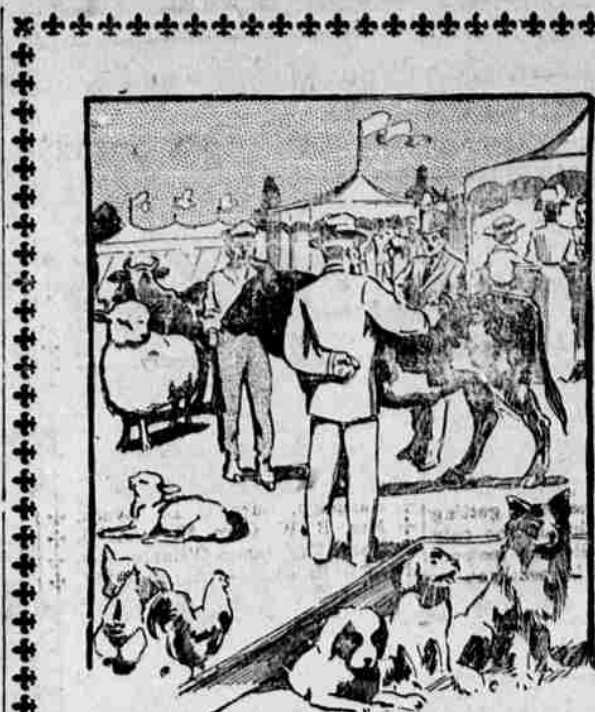

The parade tomorrow will consist of about 40 cattle and 60 horses. There will be four and six horse hitched, saddlers and drafters followed by Hereford and Shorthorn cattle, Albert Hunter, Ledbetter and McKennon, J. E. Reynolds, Palmer Lumber Co. and others will have teams besides individual specimens in the parade. W. J. Townley, W. W. Green and Sons and G. W. DeLay all of Union will parade their Shorthorn cattle as will also Blockland Bros. their Herefords.

Withycombe mounted on Galloway King, another Kentucky saddle horse owned by Mr. Levy, and with a military escort head the parade. Other prominent visiting guests will follow in automobiles.

Marshals for the day are as follows: Albert Hunter, Fred Currey, Ed Coolidge, Frank Stilwell, J. Dohbin and P. H. Spillman. The parade begins promptly at one o'clock.

### Stockmen's Convention.

(Continued from Page 1.)

To this address J. F. Blanchard of Prineville was to give the response but being absent Secretary S. O. Correll delivered the response and acceptance in behalf of delegates for the kind hospitality of the people of La Grande.

The auditing committee appointed consisted of W. H. Craven, William Dishman and Frank Landen. Resolution committee, J. E. Snow, Senator Walter Pierce and William Jones.

President Pollman spoke as follows on the conditions of the livestock industry:

"Stock conditions throughout the state are not so bad as was thought; still it is too early to get a true percentage of losses caused by the high cost of hay and the scarcity of hay. The greatest loss is in calves; from 15 to 20 per cent is now estimated.

"The loss on cattle is between six and seven percent probably.

"It is too early yet for losses to be entirely considered as so much stock is very thin that more loss is bound to result after turning on the range since the grass is so late in coming. There is no chance to get any early grass beef. Prices the past winter have been exceeding high. A year ago it was expected that cattle prices would keep along with hog prices and sheep prices. They have not. A great many people were short of feed and

the long winter has brought about a very high price for beef causing an unusual price all over the U. S.

"I believe the price may be maintained for the next 60 days at least. Beef cattle are not in the country. They will not be fed for market as in other years.

"Mutton is higher than ever before. Hogs at \$15.50 per C. Hogs at \$40 per head at about 10 months of age. These are prices at which I saw them sold last week in the State of Oregon. Beef must bring good prices this year on account of other meat being so high if for no other reason.

"Stockmen should keep their beef cattle in the very best shape to feed the people; the need is so great, greater now than ever before.

"Save the female stock, and dispose of the males, thus leaving more range for the stock that produces the best result. Few stockmen make money on steers. The stockmen who make money are those who grow cattle. There is a good outlook for the cattle business.

"Stockmen must use better judgment in providing for just such seasons as this, better judgment in the selection of stock to be wintered.

"The 640 homestead will take care of itself. Where there is no water on these large tracts there can be no stock grown. It would take 15 or 16 acres to feed one animal, then during the winter the stock would have to be moved to some place where they could be fed during that season.
