day telegraphed Governor Withycombe making the suggestion that this conference be attended also by the Western executives in person, but Governor Withycombe expressed himself as believing that he could do more good at home. He believes, particularly, that it would be proper for a member of the State Council to attend the meeting in person that he may become thoroughly familiarized with the plans of the Federal authorities, and learn what is being undertaken in other states.

Labor To Be Distributed.

The State Council, it is understood, will adopt a plan of appointing subcommittees for the direct administration of such matters as the distribution of labor where it will do the most good, provide for agricultural development, seed distribution, recruiting, taking the census of industrial and man power, and handling other matters as they arise from time to time. "Much of this work, I well realize, is largely under way," said Governor Withycombe. "Especially is this true in agricultural mobilization, where a good state organization already is started. The fullest co-operation with the agencies whose plans are now being formed will be forthcoming. It is not the idea that the State Council supersede any committees or organizations in active existence, but simply to co-ordinate their efforts for the greatest general efficiency."

Oregon's Record Lauded.

"Oregon seems to have made an enviable National record in getting another record in Army and Navy recruiting. It is now my hope that we may set still another record in prompt and patriotic cooperation with the National Council of Defense through our State Council."

The Governor asserted that he be-

called by President Kerr, held in Portland last Saturday, will be excellent and in this connection dwelt upon the immediate desirability of collecting funds locally for purchase and distribution of seed, irrespective of whether or not Oregon receives any Federal financial aid.

"Should the time come when the Government deems it necessary to regulate prices and pass other drastic war-time legislation regulating food distribution along the lines adopted in European countries," said the Governor, "presumably the State Council would be the local agency directing the work, at least in an advisory capacity with Federal officers."
