BOYS AT HIGH SCHOOL DO FINE WORK IN MANUAL TRAINING

Some excellent practical carpentry is being finished by the manual training classes of the La Grande high school. The boys under their instructor Mr. Mason have remodeled the stage in the auditorium, extending it four feet and making a 23 foot arch. The footlights have been replaced and tinned. The arch lights have been lowered and a new set constructed which can be raised or lowered. Besides this they have made new scenes, an exterior and interior set which can be moved and set up in any place. The doorway on the right side has been remodeled and made several feet larger while the back stage door has been raised so that the scenes can be taken out or in. Three drops have been added and three more to be constructed. Plans for a fireplace have been made and also lattice work and a park bench to be used in future plays. The scene painting is being done by J. C. Dell. Throughout the entire year the

boys have worked unceasingly making additional improvements to the building. All doors of the class rooms have been remodeled, two panels being taken out and glasses added. Two fine physics laboratory tables have been made with a decrease of costs of at least one-third per cent.

Between the principal's office and the adjoining recitation room one of the students constructed a door through the wall. The work is a fine showing of practical instruction and a professional carpenter would be proud of the job. The boys added to the school library another piece of fine work, that of a library case 12 feet by seven. In the domestic science room they have made a kitchen cabinet that is a piece of art. It contains the necessary shelves, drawers and in all is a perfect piece of workmanship. The practical experience gained by this work is to be boys of this community one of the most valuable studies they could pos-

sibly gain. They are intensely interested in the work and more than one are putting what they have learned into actual experience in their homes.

They constructed for the gymnasium traveling rings, climbing ropes, a vaulting box, and at present are planning to remodel all of the lockers in the locker room. In their own department they have made a lumber rack, one of the finest possible and are at present making lockers to hold their material.

The cabinet work, library tables and office desks that they have made during this term are perfect in every detail and an home would be proud to possess one of them knowing that they were made by one of the family.

Mr. Mason intends to place on exhibit Saturday at West's, Lilly's and Hills, some of their work under construction, finished, and in the rough he also invites anyone in this work to come and view the work of the boys during classes.

"HELL MORGAN'S GIRL" COMES TO THE COLONIAL.

The story of "Hell Morgan's Girl:" When Oliver Curwell disowned his son Roger because the boy declined to abandon art and go into business with his father, Roger fell into dissolute habits, going gradually from bad to worse until he was a human derelict wandering around the streets of San Francisco. As a result of the incident, Roger leaves "Sailor's Rest" and Lola in jealous retaliation accepts Sletter only

The tumult of smashing furniture in Lola's room attracts "Hell." He dashes upstairs, and in an encounter with Sletter, is shot and mortally wounded. Lola manages to drive Sletter from her room and escapes, dragging her father down a fire escape.

Hardly have they reached the ground when the terrors of San Francisco earthquake and fire break loose. "Sailor's Rest" tumbles in a burning heap. Helping her father as best she can, Lola finally reaches the Presidio where refugees are assembling from all over the city. Her father is near death and she leaves him as comfortably fixed as circumstances will permit and seeks a doctor in the crowd.

Roger has been drawn back to "Sailor's Rest" by his love for Lola, and when he finds the place a mass of ruins, he likewise wends his way to the Presidio. Fate brings the fond hearts together and Lola and Roger are reunited at the moment "Hell" Morgan dies. This is the story of "Hell Morgan's Girl" to be presented in Bluebird photoplays at the Colonial theatre on next Monday and Tuesday with Dorothy Phillips playing the start part.
