humanity; second, repairing the damage after it is done.\* In other words the Red Cross aims to prevent human waste and human wreckage.

Here are some of the things it does:

Carries on an educational campaign to prevent accidents.

Carries on an educational campaign to teach people first aid, home nursing, dietetics; in other words elementary principles of taking care of themselves and others if sick and wounded.

Teaches men the principles of sanitation, emergency ambulance work, so that they may know how to be of service in great national disasters and epidemics.

Organizes army and navy base hospitals so that they can be ready, with a corps of 7000 trained nurses and doctors to go to the front.

Organizes county chapters to take care of local emergencies, train wrecks, disasters, etc.

Trains county chapters in their duties of making supplies, etc. for the soldiers.

Trains local chapters in their duties of assisting the dependent families of soldiers and sailors that go to the front.

There are many other activities that cannot be enumerated here. In brief the Red Cross is the humanitarian arm of the government; it rises to every emergency; it does things quickly and efficiently.

## No Fire For Week Ending April 21

**CITY MANAGER REPORTS ON WORK OF FIRE, POLICE, WATER, STREET AND ENGINEERING DEPARTMENTS.**

The report of the City Manager for the week ending April 21, follows:

The fire chief reports no fires for the week; reports that truck driver Riley has quit the department and that R. O. Paynter, a former truck driver, has taken his place. Has inspected the electrical wiring in court house and reports same in bad shape.

The water superintendent reports a total expense of \$55.50, of which \$24.75 was for cleaning septic tank, \$18.75, reading meters, \$3.50 thawing 4 inch Main at B street, \$3.00 cleaning meter boxes, and \$5.50 for lowering freeze-ups. Also reports the total expense cleaning tank up to April 21, \$97.75.

The street superintendent reports a total expense of \$155.79, as follows: \$91.44 for teams and drives, \$63.75 for single hands and 60 cents for blacksmithing. Reports finishing the cleaning of the macadam road, cleaned some streets and also flushed streets in business section, hauled gravel on Oro Dell road, graded in some sewers on K, J, and I avenues, and leveled a hole on Jackson.

The city engineer reports having surveyed and determined elevation of base for footings of viaduct and recorded same with reference to city grades. Made blue print maps of outlying additions, and have same now for use in surveys of districts where permanent monuments are not now in use. Rearranged numbering for block 4 of Coggan's Add in which block there were more houses than numbers. Also spent portion of one afternoon identifying plans and specifications for Fourth street in Circuit Court. Have started map of improvement districts for use by city treasurer.

The chief of police reports three arrests for the week; two for traffic and one for pool room violations. Three convictions with total fines of \$10. The city treasurer reports as fol-
