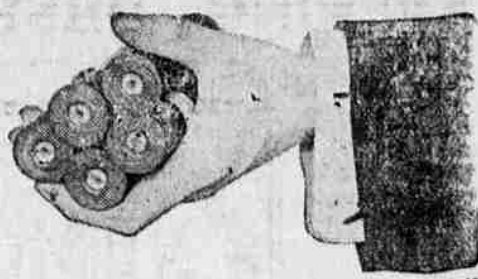

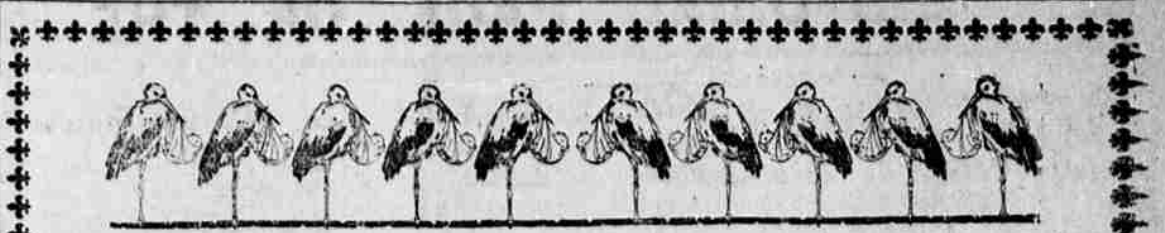

There are no less than five clubs who have brand new shortstops performing regularly and there is a horde of new regulars in the other positions.

The Reds have three new ones, all regulars, Cuzto, an outfielder, and Shean and Kopf are debutantes in the charmed circle of major leaguedom and they're getting away with it. Shean is a veteran as a ballplayer, but he has taken a veteran's place now in the majors. Kopf has seen major league duty, but never as a regular until he became shortstop for the Reds. Cuzto is a youthful Cuban who knows how to bang the ball and play the outfield.
