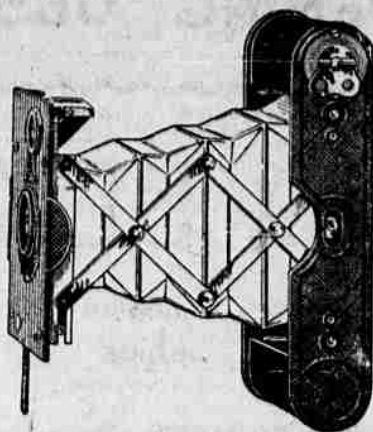

CLEAR FORT ZONES OF ALL ALIENS BY JUNE 1

Must Move if They Reside Within Half Mile of United States Defense Works.

Instructions have been sent to all United States attorneys and marshals by Attorney General Gregory regarding the enforcement of the president's proclamation of April 6 respecting the treatment of alien enemies.

All alien enemies who after April 24 have in their possession firearms, bombs or explosives shall be arrested. All alien enemies residing within one-half mile of a fort, camp, arsenal or other government yard shall be re-

quired to remove therefrom before June 1, but any alien who is a danger to the peace or safety of the government shall be removed at once and subject to summary arrest.

Any United States marshal may issue a permit to any one to continue to reside within a forbidden locality or to pass through it if the marshal is satisfied that such is not dangerous to the community or to the United States.

When permission is given to more than one alien enemy to reside or to be employed within a forbidden locality a violation of law or of the president's proclamation by any holder of a permit may result in the revocation of the permits of every alien enemy within such locality.

Alien enemies who tear down, mutilate, abuse, desecrate or insult the flag are to be regarded as "danger to the public peace" and summarily arrested.

SCHWAB'S SUCCESS FORMULA

Grace, president of the Bethlehem Steel company.

"There is no boy in this room," Mr. Schwab added, "who can't do what he did."
