9000 NURSES ARE READY.
Red Cross Declared Organized to Meet Any Emergency.
Philadelphia, May 3.—That the American people will realize within a few months for the first time the real value of the American Red Cross Relief Service was predicted by Elliot Wadsworth, acting chairman of the Red Cross, in an address here recently before the National organization of nurses of the United States.
"FOR 12 years," he said, "the American Red Cross has been organizing. The result is that the Red Cross has enrolled more than 9000 nurses whose qualifications are known, who have taken all steps requested by the Army medical corps to permit of their immediate enlistment in this service.
"AS the war develops this corps of Red Cross nurses will win the gratitude, affection and admiration of every American citizen."
