Commissioner Estill is in charge of the army in twenty-five states and 700 cities. Similar offers will go forth to these places.

Beginning this morning Chief Schuettler will have seventy-five trained nurses for emergency. In addition there will be forty-seven buildings which, if occasion demands, can be used as relief stations or temporary hospitals. Included in the list are five hotels with a total of 3,000 beds.

Complaint Is Dismissed.

The complaint against Mr. O. E. Silverthorn came up before Judge Eakin in Municipal Court yesterday afternoon and was dismissed. The charge was selling alcohol, not in accordance with the city ordinance which prescribes that it shall be sold on a physician's prescription and that an affidavit shall be taken from the customer that he intends to use it solely as prescribed by the physician and for no other purpose. The evidence showed that Mr. Silverthorn had sold the alcohol as required by law on a physician's prescription, had required the customer to make the affidavit in legal form but in the rush of business had neglected to have the customer sign the affidavit in the record book. Judge Eakin found Mr. Silverthorn. It was proved by witnesses that the oath had been legally administered by the customer.

Seattle, May 5.—(United Press)—Thomas Tracey was found not guilty of the Everett I. W. W. murder.
