Washington, May 5.—(Special)—Although the United States Marine Corps made the announcement on April 28 that they had reached their then authorized war strength of 17,400 men, the Necessary men were secured two weeks before that time, and were under training.

Two brothers who were anxious to be "first to fight" were enlisted on Friday, April 13. They were Robert Z. and Thomas B. Necessary, sons of Mrs. Sallie Necessary, of Red Rock, Texas.

"The response of red-blooded Americans to their country's call for additional marines has been particularly gratifying," said Major General George Barnett, Commandant of the Marine Corps, "and we anticipate no difficulty in securing the 12,600 more which are likely to be authorized any day, and for which recruiting has already been started."
