States, and soon after located at La Grande. Here his qualities of leadership soon made him a conspicuous figure in the business life of the city, and won for him a wide circle of warm personal friends.

When Company L of the Third Oregon Infantry regiment was organized at this place, much to the satisfaction of all the men in the company, Mr. Coolidge was made captain, and during the four years he served in this capacity, he brought Company L to such a high state of efficiency that he attracted the favorable attention and warm commendation of the regimental commander, Col. Calvin U. Gantenbein.

When Mr. Coolidge applied for appointment to the officers reserve corps, his application was accompanied by a fine letter from his former commander, Col. Gantenbein, who recommended his appointment in the highest terms, as one of the most capable officers in the Third Oregon regiment.

Mr. Coolidge is a young man of exceptionally fine character and winning personality. He has all the qualifications for the making of a gallant officer. La Grande has reason to be proud of its first contribution of an officer for the Grand Army of the Republic. His many friends in this city will watch his future career with high expectations and great interest.

Mine Disaster

Pittston, Jan. 9.—At 7 o'clock this morning, just after the miners had descended into the Pennsylvania Coal Company's shaft No. 4, near this place, a terrible gas explosion took place near the carriage way, by which several men are supposed to have been killed. There has been for several days a great change going on in a few mines adjoining No. 4, making itself visible on the surface by immense crevices, toppling over school houses, dwellings, etc. The gas forced itself into No. 4, and when Perry Daly, mining boss, opened the door leading to the old workings, an explosion took place that shook the earth in that vicinity with terrific force.

Governor Cullom on Resumption. Springfield, Jan. 10.—The legislature met at noon today and Governor Cullom's message was delivered. It designates the resumption of specie payment as one of the grandest achievements in the financial history of the nation, and as an evidence of wise policy and the enormous resources of the country.

A Puget Sound Land Case. Washington, Jan. 10.—The secretary of the interior, on the 9th inst., affirmed the action of the commissioner of the general land office in denying an application of Peter D. Jessup to enter a tract of land in Olympia district of Washington Territory.

The Cheyennes Make Trouble. News from Fort Robinson, Jan 10th, says that private Ferguson, Co. A, Third Cavalry was stabbed by the Cheyenne Chief, Wild Hog, while the soldiers were attempting to disarm him, he being armed with several big knives and is a very strong savage, an Indian Hercules. These Indians left the South because they say they are starving there, and when ordered to return, refused to do so on that account. Efforts to make them go were unavailing. They declare they will die first and hold out in captivity on short rations of fuel and food, refusing to be either frozen or starved into returning. Wild Hog finally consented to use his influence in that direction, but his son and others say they will die first. The latest word is as follows:

Omaha, Jan. 10.—A dispatch received by General Crook this morning says that there were 30 Cheyennes killed last night at Fort Robinson, Nebraska, and that 50 prisoners have been recaptured from among fugitives Captain Wessels, with five companies, is in pursuit. There were 150 prisoners in a frame building, from which all but 30 defiantly refused to be removed preparatory to departure for the Indian Territory. When they
