Serve Dinner to Athletes.

Union, May 7.—(Special)—The domestic science department of the high school served dinner to the visiting boys participating in the track meet. The girls were limited to 25c per plate, and were able to serve a very splendid dinner after figuring up costs to within one-sixteenth of a cent. The department has done splendid work this year under the very able management of Miss Johnstone who has been retained for another year. The girls have been taught economy of the strictest type.

Women Work For Railroads.

Tacoma, Wash., May 7.—(United Press)—Big eastern railroads are not alone in putting women in jobs left vacant by railroadmen who have enlisted. An order by Superintendent

J. J. McCulloch of the Seattle, Tacoma and Auburn terminals in effect here today instructs all department heads to employ women "wherever a man quits." The women are given clerical jobs, as well as yard jobs, checking jobs, engine wiping jobs, engine callers, etc., and work under the same conditions as men. The same order has been issued by district superintendents of the Northern Pacific all over the entire system.

Hoe Parade May 12.

Portland, Ore., May 7.—(United Press)—Portland's unique "hoe parade", arrangements for which are being completed today, will be staged on the evening of May 12. Thousands of Portlanders are expected to walk through downtown streets, each carrying a hoe or other garden tool and each wearing old clothes, which is in-

tended to promote the cause of food preparedness.

Five Cent Loaf a Novelty.

Portland, Ore., May 7.—(United Press)—The 5-cent loaf of bread is a novelty here today. A majority of Portland bakeries today began putting out only 10 and 15-cent loaves. The 10-cent size weighs 18 ounces and the 15-cent size 26 ounces. Rolls which sold last week at 10c a dozen today were advanced to 15 cents.

In explaining the increase in the price of bread, one prominent local baker said today that all raw materials have made a general advance of 82 per cent in the last few months. "Iard has gone up nine times in 45 days," he said. "Other oil for shortening has gone up 80 per cent. Milk powder and condensed milk have doubled in price, and everybody knows the steady advance in the price of "

High Prices For Fish.

Astoria, Ore., May 7.—(United Press)—With the highest prices ever paid for fish, 2,000 fishermen are covering the lower Columbia river in what promises to be the greatest season ever known here. In what is said to be an attempt to freeze out the smaller cannerymen along the river, the big packers have adopted a price of 10 cents a pound for ordinary salmon with bonuses for larger fish. Catches up to today since the season started May 1 have been unusually good.

Grants Pass To Have Garden.

Grants Pass, Ore., May 7.—(United Press)—Grants Pass will have a community garden patch. Twohy Brothers offered the people of the town a five-acre tract which will be planted and cared for by the Boy Scouts under the guidance of the Grants Pass branch of the Patriotic Service League.

WHO?WHAT?WHY? NEW YORK TO ASK

Military Census Takers Have Eighty-seven Questions.

TO QUERY ALL MEN AND BOYS

Employment and Experience Are Leading Facts That the Authorities Desire to Know—Seek to Find Whether Men Will Be More Valuable at Home or In the Trenches.

The New York military authorities have completed the list of eighty-seven questions which are to be asked all male inhabitants between the ages of nineteen and twenty-five when the military census is compiled during the first two weeks in May. Males between these ages will be liable to service under the first call to arms.

Questions to be answered by all other persons in the state between the ages of sixteen and sixty-four will follow quite closely those for males in the nineteen to twenty-five year class, who will be required to answer the questions which follow:

Name in full? Residence? Age? Height? Weight? Color or race? Nationality?

Of what country are you a citizen or subject? Nationality of father? Of mother? How many persons are wholly dependent upon you for support? Have you attended elementary schools? High school? Technical school? College?

As to Languages.

What language other than English can you speak well? What is your present occupation? Name former occupations in order of importance?

Have you ever been in the military or naval service or had military or naval training at college, school, camp or cruise? If so, state in what country, when, how long, in what organization, highest grade held.

Are you in the military or naval service now? Have you an application for enlistment pending? Have you ever been rejected for enlistment? If so, why?

Can you drive an automobile? Operate a telegraph? Ride a motorcycle? Operate a wireless? Handle a power boat? Operate a stationary steam engine? Operate an aeroplane? Handle electrical machinery? Operate a steam locomotive?

Do you hold a license as engineer? Pilot? Navigator? Have you ever been employed in shipbuilding?

What's Your Business?

Have you any serious physical defects? If so, name it. Are you married, single, widower or divorced?

Are you a citizen of the United States? If not, how many years have you lived in the United States? If not, have you taken out your first papers? If so, in what year?

Are you an employer or director of labor (other than domestic service)? State approximate number under your charge. Do you claim exemption from military service? Why? Give name of your present employer, employer's business address, employer's business.

How many of each of the following do you own: Automobile? Auto trucks? Vans? Wagons or trucks? Wireless outfit? Motorcycles? Motorcycle with side car attached? Draft horses? Light draft horses? Saddle horses? Mules? Milk cows? Beef cattle? Other small livestock? Rifles?

And What Do You Own?

Do you own a ship, yacht, motor launch or power boat?

In cases of things owned the location is asked, with particulars as to make, power and other details of automobile or craft.

In the case of dependents, details are asked of names, ages, sex, relationship and residence of dependents, if any, including all children under sixteen years of age. In the case of husband and wife living together the husband alone is to list all dependents of both husband and wife, including children under sixteen years.

VON, BISSING A TYRANT.

It Was He Who Ordered the Execution of Edith Cavell.

General Baron Moritz Ferdinand von Bissing, who was recently reported dead, was appointed governor general of Belgium in November, 1914, in succession to General von der Goitz. He was born in 1844.

During his rule in Belgium General von Bissing came into prominence many times, notably in connection with the execution of Miss Edith Cavell, the English nurse; frequent clashes with Cardinal Mercier, primate of Belgium, and the deportation of Belgians.

It was reported in 1915 that he had ordered the roundup of spies and persons suspected of working against the Germans in Belgium and that scores of executions followed the carrying out of his order. Several times by his order Belgian cities and towns were fined heavily for alleged breaking of rules laid down by him.

He had been ill off and on for more than a year.

Marshall Field 3d as Private.

Marshall Field 3d, one of America's wealthiest men, has enlisted as a private in the First Illinois cavalry. He will draw \$15 a month. Mr. Field is twenty-three years old and is married and is heir to an estate of \$400,000,000.
