WARNER TO LECTURE.

(Continued from Page 1.)

American people have not considered the conflict with the seriousness that one experiences by actual participation in it. Also that it was very different from his conception of warfare. He landed in France the third of November, 1914; his company relieved the Seventh City of London Fusiliers near the region of Ypres. He went through the battle of Neuve Chapelle, battle of Fustebert or the battle of Orchard as they term it, May 19, 10 and 21, 1915. He tells of an atrocity of the Germans that during this conflict, Sergeant Lacy of the 16th Canadian, was discovered by the troop crucified to a barn door with a bayonet through hands and feet, and still living. During the time that followed up to the second battle of Ypres he spent most of the time in and out of trenches. And on the 12th of May, 1916, the trench in which he was fighting was undermined, blown up and he was crippled for life, his right leg being crushed. He said today his application has been forwarded to a Colonel in New York City who has been organizing a regiment to go with a company of volunteers, even though he was crippled. He is the last remaining man of his family, having lost three broth-

ers and two brothers-in-law.

In his lecture which will be announced at a later date he will tell of the life in the trenches. He also states that it is his candid opinion that the war will end before September.

Captain Warner will lecture at the Arcade tonight and tomorrow evening.

Kerr, of Oregon Agricultural College, telegraphed William Pollman, president of the Oregon Cattle and Horse Raisers' association since its formation four years ago, asking that he act as member of the executive committee of the food preparedness campaign in Oregon. Mr. Pollman immediately accepted the appointment.

"The Cattle and Horse Raisers' association stands ready to do anything that will aid and assist at this trying moment and I am glad to be of service to our country at this time," said Mr. Pollman.
