The campaign was entered into as a patriotic move giving all people interested a chance to help solve our food problems. But when it came to getting lots for gardening rent free it seems that the prospects for increased revenue excited some owners to the point where they were willing to rent on fifty-fifty basis, lots that had not been cultivated for a period of fifteen years.

If you have a lot that can be cultivated and cannot cultivate it yourself please notify the committee. The work of the Honor Guard girls has clearly demonstrated that there are more gardens planted this year than ever before in the history of our city.

So let everybody, real estate owners, merchants, working people and all go into this matter of raising garden with from a patriotic point of view forgetting entirely the monetary side. And when he comes back, he will find his position in the bank waiting for him. This is the way we feel towards him."

This remark was greeted with great applause. Mr. O. F. Coolidge was called upon and he briefly expressed his approval of his boy's action.

Clarke Leiter praised the patriotism which had prompted the two men to volunteer.

It is hard to express in words the atmosphere of the banquet; every one present felt the seriousness of the occasion although they did their best to shake it off. The fact is that it brought the war close home to every one present. At the conclusion Mr. Holmes on behalf of all wished the boys godspeed and a safe return.
