Needs of the Marine Corps.

Washington, May 8.—(Special)—The Marine Corps is especially in need of technical men—men experienced in electrical, mechanical, civil and automobile engineering, and avia-

tion, and is offering special inducements to men of this kind who want to be "first to fight," according to an announcement made from their headquarters today.

To insure a completely uniform and trained body all Marine Corps recruits must first undergo preliminary military and naval training, but upon its completion those so desiring are available for positions in which they are best fitted.

Too Many Spuds Next Year Is The Warning

Milwaukee, Wis., May 8.—(United Press)—Unless the frenzied planting of potatoes is stopped, next season will find an over-supply, with prices far below the normal according to state agricultural experts here. These agriculturists are engaged in a campaign to prevent the overplanting of potatoes and are urging the planting of turnips, parsnips, carrots, onions, and other root crops instead.

Columbus, O., May 8.—(United Press)—State institutions will produce at least 75,000 bushels of potatoes during the coming season, with favorable weather, say members of the state board of administration.

Oberlin, O., May 8.—(United Press)—Coods of Oberlin college have leased several acres of land and will raise their own potatoes this season.
