Instead of the usual seven to ten courses, only three were served to the visiting English and French commissions at two dinners rivaling in importance and formality any ever served in America. The menus for both dinners included an appetizer of tomatoes with anchovies; plain soup; fillet of beef with peas and potatoes;

salad; ice and coffee and cigars. The dinners were in line with the policy of economy recently announced by Mrs. Wilson and the wives of the cabinet members.

King Karl Uses Phone, Surprises Vienna

The Hague, April 20.—(By Mail)—(United Press)—It isn't safe in Vienna to tell the other party to "Go to Stockholm!" when the telephone wires become crossed. The irate speaker might be addressing himself thus to King Karl, whose reign to date has been marked by the ruthless swatting of precedents. Vienna newspapers bristled with exclamation points of surprise in recording King Karl's informality in telephoning people to whom he wants to talk. "Hello! This is Karl," said the monarch in the phone call that aroused the compilers of books on court etiquette. He was speaking to the Minister of Finance, in an effort to find Count Tisza. Etiquette specialists say the King should have sent a command telegram, prepaid, charged to the treasury, ordering Tisza to report at Headquarters. This would have taken hours but a phone call even in Vienna doesn't take more than 15 minutes.
