BIG DANE HAS RECORD AS A FINE WRESTLER

IS PREPARING FOR HIS FINISH MATCH WITH FRED GUNDERSON ON MAY 17

The finish wrestling match between Harold Christensen, the big Dane, and Fred Gunderson at the Arcade Theatre May 17th promises more thrills than any wrestling contest staged in Eastern Oregon in a long time. Gunderson has been out of the game the past year but is naturally very strong and rugged and all he requires is a little polishing up on the mat to put him in the pink of condition for the contest.

A letter from him states he is doing considerable work averaging about ten miles a day and has a retinue of five husky wrestlers who give him good work on the mat. He states this in his "come back" match and he is determined to win.

Harold Christensen took two falls in three from Pete Visser of Ogden at the Pinney Theatre, Boise, last Friday night, thereby entitling him to the claim of Intermountain champion.

The Idaho Statesman of May 5th makes the following comment on the match:

"After dropping one fall when he lost control of a right arm that had wandered into the vicious hug of a hammerlock, Harold Christensen clamped his sturdy nether limbs just underneath Pete Visser's floating ribs Friday night at the Pinney and accomplished his entirely efficacious scissors with an arm lock. The Utah gamely took the gaff for several minutes but when he muttered, 'Let him have it,' to referee Otto Jones the match was virtually over. A third fall took but 12 minutes, Christensen grabbing it with a quarter nelson and knee lock.

"The fray was speedy from the first call of time. Visser had a slight edge in aggressiveness up to the moment of the application of that fatal scissors but both men were eager and each tried a wide variety of holds whenever he was behind his opponent.

"How First Fall Went. "Pete was lolling on Christensen's back when the two grapplers first went to the mat but the Dane slipped out of a wicked looking abdominal leg vise and began to do some affirmative wrestling on his own account. Visser had a near head scissors at the call of 15 minutes and almost applied that dangerous hold to Christensen's left arm.

"The Dane was behind at 25 and a minute later the two men had pulled mutual bridges that drew considerable applause. Pete recovered quickly from his bridge, slapped on a leg scissors and got a hammerlock. Christensen conceded the fall because he had completely lost control of the arm Visser was embracing. The time was 28 1/2 minutes.

"The men sparred on their feet for some five minutes at the opening of their second session. The Dane finally leaped on his opponent's neck and brought him to the rosin, definitely taking the aggressive for the first time during the evening. Visser escaped from a double nelson with a clever bridge and head spin, coming up to punish Chris a bit with a head lock accentuated by a pedaling movement.

"Dane Gets Two Falls. "The Dane slipped on a half nelson at 20 minutes and began to try for his scissors. His legs fitted into the more or less yielding muscle below Visser's ribs 60 seconds later, and the half nelson became an arm lock. Pete battled hard but had to give in. The time was 24 1/2 minutes.

"The third fall was obtained in a hurry. Pete went behind first but he kept feeling an evidently injured side and when Christ put on a quarter nelson abetted by a near body scissors that was really a knee lock the Utah boy again made the fall concession."

BRAZIL CONTROLS ITS GERMAN POPULATION

Rio De Janeiro, April 15.—(United Press)—(By Mail)—Stories to the effect that German colonists settled in the three southernmost states of Brazil are sufficiently numerous and organized to dictate terms at the bayonet's point should the occasion ever arise were made to appear ridiculous by the publication today of statistics showing that the total number of Germans immigrating to Brazil since 1828 is less than 150,000.

Up to the time of the fall of the empire in 1889 only 75,387 Germans had entered Brazilian ports. From 1889 to 1915 this number was increased by 56,102, making a total of 131,489. The census returns gives the descendants of these Germans as Brazilians—maybe "hyphenated" but Brazilians.
