**Valuable Horses Are Purchased**  
 The pure bred stock industry of Union county has again been enriched by the addition of more Blue Ribbon winners. W. R. Ledbetter of Alico has just returned from Colfax, Wn., with a pure bred Shire stallion, Wilson Idol. This horse was a winner at the International Stock show at Chicago and his arrival will be hailed with delight by all Union county horse men. Wilson Idol stands seventeen hands high, has perfect conformation, weighs a ton, has perfect action and shows the true markings of a Shire. He has the typical Shire head, proper proportion of bone and is jet black. He will be placed at the head of the Ledbetter stud. Wilson Idol is five years old.

Mr. Ledbetter disposed of his grand champion and ever since has been combing the markets of the Northwest for a horse to take his place. He believes that in Wilson Idol he has discovered exactly the horse he has been looking for. He also purchased at the same time a Blue Ribbon winner Shire mare, which will be exhibited with Wilson Idol at the coming fairs and horse shows throughout the country. With the shipment came a splendid Clyde, a prize winner at the Panama-Pacific exposition. This fine animal will be added to the N. K. West stables. All of these horses are considered the best of their kind in the northwest, so Union county is to be congratulated on having acquired such splendid animals.

**MAGNETS READY TO CHANGE OPENING DATES**  
 New York, May 10.—(United Press)—In spite of Ban Johnson, Gov. Tener and others who favor early openings for the baseball season it is evident that a strong fight will be made at next winter's big league meetings for a change in the dates. The almost unbearable weather which greeted the players when they tried to open this year undoubtedly was the fatal straw. Five or six magnets have expressed themselves very strongly against another opening during the season of uncertain weather.  
 Charles H. Ebbets, president of the

Brooklyn club, is expected to lead the raiding battalion in the National league, and the New York club probably will come out flatly in support of the change in the American league. It has been argued by both Ban Johnson and Gov. Tener that a later opening date would gain nothing because bad weather is just as likely to strike in May as in April. It has been pointed out that many clubs have lost day after day in May because of rain. It has not been pointed out by the exponents of the present system of opening, however, that snow and cold are as much responsible for double headers laid over from April as is rain. And when a baseball fan goes to a baseball park and spends the afternoon shivering he is likely to reach a conclusion that his next visit will be along about July 4. And a fan once turned is a fan almost unmade. One shiver is enough to take many a dollar out of the magnets' pockets. The baseball fan doesn't mind if he is deprived of a baseball game through rain, because that's expected all through the season, but when magnets insist on playing baseball, despite low temperatures it—speaking the unvarnished truth—corals his anger. Magnets also are beginning to figure how much money they would save if they took their expensive employees south later in the year and then brought them back to a climate in which they could play ball.
