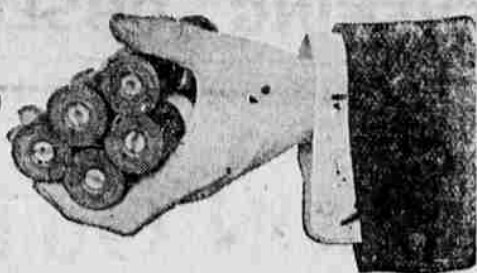

Regulations Are Established Whereby People May Appeal Directly to the Throne—Russia Revolution Accentuates the Tendency to Spread Democratic Ideas—Grievances Will Now Be Forwarded to His Majesty.

BY RALPH TURNER (United Press Staff Correspondent) Tokyo, April 2.—(By Mail)—Japanese people have seen within the past few days a considerable advance in the constitutional history of Japan—the establishment of regulations by which the Japanese people may appeal direct to the throne.
