Catherine Creek Floods Surrounding Country at Union.

The warmth of "Old Sol" yesterday sent a greater volume of water down Catherine creek at Union than has been known for years. Two of the bridges within the city limits have been condemned, the water having washed out the banks near the sides of each. Several miles below the town a number of the farmers have been compelled to move their housekeeping goods and families out to keep from being marooned or flooded. The levees near the Miller place have been broken letting the water out over the fields. The same is true at the old McKennon ranch recently purchased by W. J. Townley.

The people of Union are looking for a greater volume of water yet as the snow in the surrounding mountains is still very deep and is not melting very fast. Although the heat of the past few days has diminished a great amount of snow there is plenty left.

Chicago, May 14.—(Special)—The legal club will eschew wines and liquors at its annual banquet May 28 and use the money to buy war bonds.

Ice Cream Cones for Hogs.

Chicago, May 14.—(Special)—Morris & Co. is fattening its hogs on ice cream cones as an example for food economy. Corn costs about \$1.70 a bushel, while the cones were bought for \$26 a ton.

Germany Becomes Isolated.

Amsterdam, May 14.—(United Press)—Except between themselves and Switzerland, Holland and Scandinavia, the central powers are now entirely isolated from mail communication with the world. Berlin's announcement today that "owing to impossibility of safe communication," mail service has been discontinued with Spain, Mexico and Central and South America, put the final seal of isolation on the central power nations.

Austrian People Exhorted.

Amsterdam, via London, May 14.—(Special)—An exhortation to the Austrian people to hold out until the new harvest gives relief is made by Emperor Charles in an autographic letter to Premier Clam-Martinic, of Austria, which is published in the Zeitung of Vienna. The Emperor writes:

"The third war winter, with all its hardships, is behind us, and though there is still many a month before us until the growing seeds give us food we may expect that spring will bring us relief. Until then we must hold out, and in this we shall doubtless be successful, though encountering great hardships."

The emperor praised his people for all that has been done and appeals to them to continue to do their utmost for the welfare of the empire.

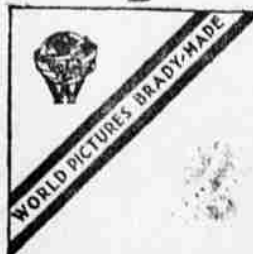
