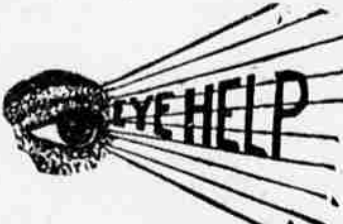
The Antics of Arbuckle at Their Best
