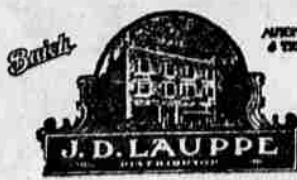

LITTLE WILLIE GETS A NEW CHORE IN LONDON

London, April 23.—(By Mail)—Rushing the growler for Irish stew or fresh duck soup will soon become one of the chores of five-year-old Willie in the poorer districts of London. To solve the problem of feeding the poor, with food at the present high prices, arrangements are being made to peddle cook provender from donkey-carts. Over 100,000 persons a day may be fed in this manner when the system is fully developed. Central kitchens will be established in the East End, Central and North London and the western districts of the city. These kitchens will be supplied directly from the

CROP CONDITIONS SHOW IMPROVEMENT
Livestock Still Suffering, However, From Effects of the Hard Winter.

Following are reports received from interior representatives outlining present crop conditions in their respective districts covered by the O.-W. R. R. & N. company:

La Grande—Spring plowing and seeding under way, grass growing nicely and fall wheat coming along fine. Livestock still improving. Fruit trees are beginning to blossom in places.

Elgin—There are several of the farmers plowing now, but it is estimated that by the first of the week all will be able to start at full swing. Fall grain looking good and pasture is picking up very rapidly. Trees are beginning to bud out.

Wallowa—Soil sufficient moisture; pasture improving, is backward for time of year. Livestock improving but thin, account lack of food. Fall wheat growing good; spring plowing just commencing.

Enterprise—Soil in excellent condition for working and growing grain. Livestock for most part are not in condition to be shipped account hard winter. Fall grain in good condition. Acreage 20 per cent over last year. Spring seeding progressing favorably. Hay crop will be probably 25 per cent over last year.

Baker—Soil in good condition. Pasture good; livestock good condition. About 50 per cent fall wheat rotten; must resow about 50 per cent spring wheat. Conditions now favorable for crops of all kinds.

Imbler—Fall sown grain is looking good and the spring sown is well under way; seeding should be completed in about two or three weeks. No potatoes sown yet, but expect heavy acreage. Livestock: Very little if any more than home consumption at the present time. Farm pasturage is good but no range.
