After May 21st fishing and hunting licenses will raise 50 cents each or \$1.50 each and \$3.00 for the two. Sportsmen should take an advantage of this and purchase their licenses for the coming season before that date thus saving \$1.00 on the two. Women are not required to have fishing license but must have the hunting license. All male persons 14 years and over are required to have fishing licenses this season. The only people entitled to free licenses are the Civil and Indian War veterans, this does not apply to Spanish War veterans as they must have regular licenses to angle in the waters of Oregon.

Salvation Army To Help United States

Philadelphia, May 15.—(United Press)—The Salvation Army has joined the allies. With Commander Evangeline Booth directing operations, several thousand delegates to the Eastern division's convention today got down to work on real war organization.

The army won't send men to the trenches, but it will fight America's battle at home by establishing and equipping ambulance units and helping soldiers' families. Plans under discussion here today, when adopted, will apply to all Salvation Army divisions in the United States. Two hundred and fifty meetings will be held during the convention here.
