The Pure Milk and Cream company was Tuesday sold to Wallace Cass, who has been one of the provenders of milk to the institution since its inauguration January 1st. Mr. Cass took possession this morning and will immediately add to the equipment of the plant by installation of a new separator and additional coolers to combat the approach of warm weather.

The new proprietor will continue to distribute milk and cream just as before, exercising the same vigilance to give clean and pure milk as has been done prior to his proprietorship. The Groat dairy product will continue to be handled as before. Groat customers receiving milk from that dairy and Cass customers receiving the Cass dairy product. There will be no change in this respect over the former plan of handling the milk. The station remains at the same location.

"The new proprietor of the Pure Milk & Cream company has had a long training in the milk business," explained George H. Currey in retiring from the firm, today. "He has had long experience in creameries,

cream shipping stations and in the actual and practical administration of Oregon dairies. He will apply expert knowledge to the handling of cream and milk coming through his plant."

Patrons will experience no inconvenience; deliveries will go on as before, and in no way disturb the former routine.

Eugene, Ore., May 17.—(United Press)—Two members of the faculty of the University of Oregon have already laid down their college work and departed for military service. Ben. H. Williams, secretary of the social welfare work in the extension division, who is also secretary of the Oregon Alumni association, and Professor Allan C. Hopkins, of the School of Commerce, today are at the reserve officers' training camp at the Presidio, Cal. Other faculty members had their applications in, but have not received instructions to report at the camp.

Students are leaving the state university daily to enter various branches of the service. Nine are at the officers' training camp at the Presidio alone, and all other branches of the service are represented.

Spokane, Wash., May 17.—(United Press)—Woe upon the manufacturers of the American flag stickers if Spokane laundrymen ever get their hands on them!

Bend, Or., May 17.—(United Press)—Estimates of damage to the alfalfa crop earlier in the year over-estimated the loss, according to County Agriculturist R. A. Blanchard. Examination of the roots of plants apparently killed during the winter has given a basis for the theory that a form of fungus growth is responsible for the trouble. New shoots are springing up from what were apparently dead plants.

Weather news is now received regularly by wireless at 270 amateur radio stations located in nine of the

Northern and Western states. In this way the wireless operator is enabled to give his neighborhood the weather forecast as soon as it is issued.

Newberg, Ore., May 17.—(United Press)—The thirty-second annual convention of the Oregon State Sunday School association, will open here this afternoon in the Friends' church, and will close Friday, May 18. Leading Sunday school workers in the state are on the convention program. Among those who will speak tomorrow afternoon and evening, are Professor M. S. Pitman, of the Monmouth State Normal; Walter C. Moore, of Salem, and Dr. J. D. Springston.

Portland, Ore., May 17.—(United Press)—Portland may have streetcar women. In fact, Portland would probably have had "motorwomen" and conductors recruited from the fairer sex were it not for the fact that the officials of the company don't know how the public would take the innovation. "The company has lost one-third of its street-car men," said one official today. "The propriety of hiring women to fill the places of men gone to war has often been discussed."

"Many women drive their own automobiles. Streetcar motoring is no more difficult and not so dangerous."

"It's next to impossible to find men right now to fill the vacancies, and it is but a question of time—a short time—when there must be a showdown. And I wager the women will win."

Cottage Grove, Ore., May 17.—(United Press)—When the sixth company, Oregon coast artillery, is called to the colors, it will have among its members five brothers from one family—all rugged mountaineers. They are Adois, Grover, John, Reeson and Marimos Devine, sons of David Devine, of the Elkshead country. Each of the boys is an expert with the rifle.

Seattle, Wash., May 17.—(United Press)—Selective service registration day will be a patriotic and gala occasion throughout the state of Washington, if Governor Lister follows the suggestions launched by Sheriff Jack Stringer here today. Business houses will close and patriotic demonstrations will make registration day an event to be remembered. Seattle newspapers are urging the suggestion.

Salem, Ore., May 17.—(United Press)—Public Service Commissioner Buchtel has his own sweet opinion of service most northwestern railroads are offering. Although these roads are now petitioning for a general 15 per cent increase in freight rates, Buchtel declared today he thought the rates should be reduced to be commensurate with the service rendered.

"The car shortage is an instance of inadequate service," he declared. "During the last two years the carriers have furnished miserable service and yet have gained enormously in wealth while the shippers have not received a just return for the payments made."

"Besides urging that more rolling stock is needed, the carriers also advance as a reason for an increase in freight rates that the price of fuel, materials, supplies, etc., are abnormal. While this latter contention is true, it must also be borne in mind that the carriers are enjoying abnormal business, and that the operating revenues of the principal roads in Oregon have increased by millions in the last year."

Mr. and Mrs. Welds were visitors to the Junction Sunday.

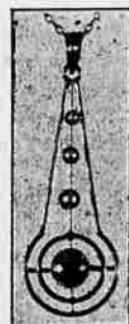
