### Lengthen Vegetable Garden Season.

Provision should be made as far as possible to produce vegetables as long as the growing season will permit; when the regular season is over a supply will still be made available to a great extent by the use of the cold frames for the growing of lettuce, radishes, etc., by the storage cellar; and the pantry of canned goods.

### Selection of Vegetables for the War Garden.

In a valuable back garden lot, vegetables should be planted which would cost the most money on the market and which can be successfully

grown with careful attention. As a rule, it will be unprofitable to plant the whole lot to potatoes. This food is usually cheaper than other vegetables that must necessarily be bought, such as cabbage, tomatoes, beans, peas, cauliflower, lettuce, celery, sweet corn, etc. In the following table is listed the comparative value of vegetables crops that might be grown, 100-foot row of each being taken as a basis for comparison:

Vegetable	Yield per 100-ft. Row
Asparagus	35 pounds
String Beans	1 1-2 bushels
Beets	4 bushels
Cabbage, early	120 pounds

Cabbage, late	200 pounds
Carrots	4 bushels
Cauliflower	60 pounds
Celery	15 dozen
Lettuce	150 heads
Onions	2 1-2 bushels
Peas	3 bushels
Sweet Corn	16 dozen ears
Tomatoes	8-10 bushels
Potatoes	150-175 pounds

### BEANS WILL BE PROFITABLE.

We cannot overdo on bean production. We are limited in bean production only by seed resources. Many farmers and many storekeepers, as well as residents of the cities and towns, have small quantities of beans, varying from five or ten pounds up to several hundred pounds of them. Patriotic spirit should make these beans available for planting purposes in the gardens, lots, and in the fields. Lady Washington beans are especially desirable. Mexican tree beans and Red Mexicans are well-known, successful varieties in both Eastern and Western Oregon. The demand for bean seed is becoming so insistent that it is doubtful whether there will be enough seed of these varieties for planting. Numerous other varieties of the colored beans, speckled beans, kidney beans and so on mature in both Eastern and Western Oregon every year. While these may not command as high a price by a half cent to one cent per pound, usually these larger beans will yield as well or better than some of the smaller-seeded varieties. Regardless of yield or price, there is every indication that we shall need, for food purposes, every bean that Oregon can produce and that there will be profit in their production. If you cannot secure Lady Washingtons, or Mexican tree beans or Red Mexicans, grow any other kind of bean that is known to mature successfully in your locality. The Agricultural College has a new bean bulletin which will give directions. Pound for pound, ton for ton, acre for acre, there is practically no crop that will render more assistance in winning the war than beans.

Also thousands of acres of summer fallow land in Eastern and Western Oregon can be devoted to the culture of corn which will relieve the stock feed situation enormously and which will help materially in other lines. There are still two to three weeks in which corn of such early varieties as Minnesota No. 23, Ore-

Agricultural Defense Day was observed in Cove Saturday evening at Trippier's hall. M. L. Carter spoke. Mrs. Robert Baxter was in La Grande a couple of days this week.

There will be a mass meeting at Maccabee hall Thursday evening in the interest of the Chery fair.

The Rev. John Lewtas is a member of the board of management of Chautauqua, also a member of its lecture course. Rev. Lewtas has spent several years traveling in foreign countries gathering material for the lecture platform.

He has just returned from an extended trip in England, Belgium and France where he was engaged as a war correspondent. At the front he came in contact with soldier life in the trenches and on the firing line.

Rev. Lewtas presented for inspection his American passport guaranteeing to him safe conduct and protection in this and in the countries named.

Prof. Linden McCullough gave many war statistics many of which the human mind could grasp only by comparison. He also spoke along the line of duration of the great European conflict, stating that the consensus of opinion of the world's master minds that are in close touch with all conditions see no hope of the struggle ending under two years and may be prolonged three to five years.

Dr. Holt gave a short talk on the relation of medical science to the army and navy, what the former is doing and the constantly widening field of future operations.

Attorney Robert S. Eakin of La Grande made an eloquent speech on the noble work being done by the Y. M. C. A. stating that the organization was the only one working with unselfish interest on both sides of the war, that it furnished the only touch of home life the soldier had, at each headquarters one secretary and one or two assistants serve about 5000 soldiers, here stationary and reading material are furnished free and through these headquarters many of the soldiers receive their mail.

Private Randall of Company M, La Grande, spoke with especial praise of the Y. M. C. A. and the good it was doing the soldier boys; he paid a high tribute to the many good things the La Grande branch is doing for Company M.

Services will be held at the Baptist church Sunday. Rev. E. O. Otto will preach.

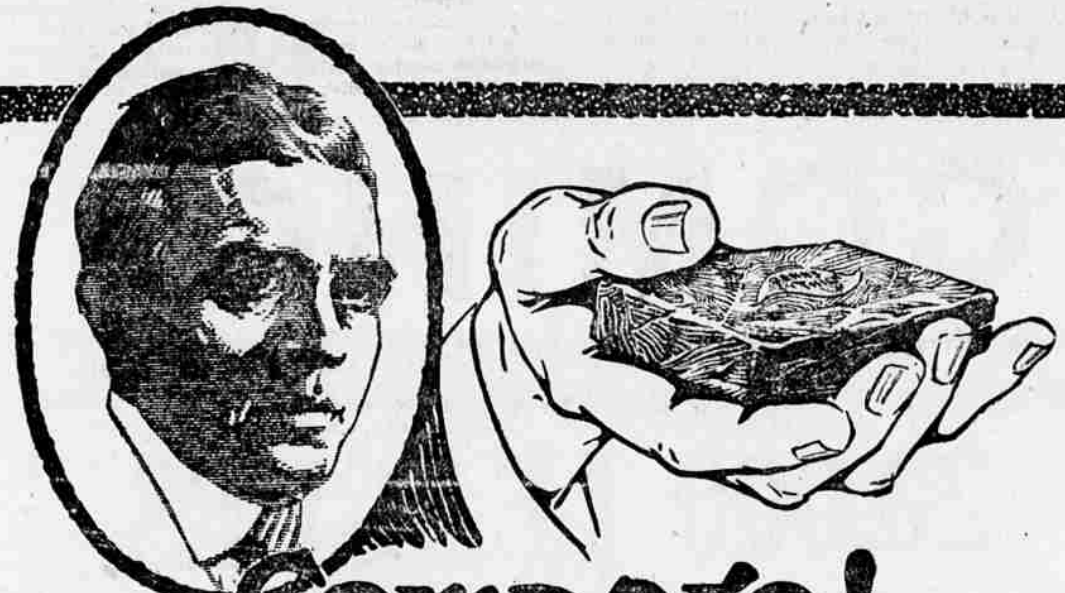
