Marshfield, Ore., May 23.—(United Press)—Port Orford today claims the distinction of being the most patriotic town in the state of Oregon. One-third of its entire male population has gone to war, and there is not a man between the ages of 21 and 31, the conscription age, left in the town. None of the men who have offered their services to their country from Port Orford have failed to pass the strict physical examinations. 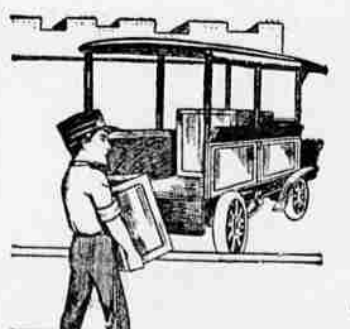
