RED CROSS CLASSES FORMING.

Classes are forming for the different courses of Red Cross instruction. Registration for these courses falls into two classes, "A" and "B." Class A (Nurses' Aids), applicants must be women between the ages of 18 and 45 with the required physical, mental and moral qualifications and without restricting home ties, who agree seriously to pursue in their entirety the courses. These, after passing the examinations and fulfilling all requirements may be attached to military units. Class B (laywomen), it is the purpose also of the Bureau of Nursing service to carry into the home of the people a better knowledge of the underlying principles of health by means of the courses of instruction given under its direction. Then for women not available for actual service but who desire the instruction may take any of the courses and may receive a Red Cross certificate after passing the examination. However lay women may take the courses of instruction and need not pass the examination.

In group B applicants must be 16 years of age and upward. No one will be received to classes after the first lesson. Classes cannot be organized with less than 10 nor more than 25. New classes may be formed whenever a sufficient number is secured.

The cost of the courses in first aid hygiene and nursing or dietetics will be probably \$3.50 each member and must be met by the class. This provides for teacher, equipment, etc. For further information call Mrs. E. P. Mossman afternoons between 1 and 2 o'clock.

NEW WESTMINSTER WILL HAVE GERMAN TROPHY

New Westminster, B. C., May 29.—(United Press)—New Westminster is going to have a German machine gun, captured by Canadians on the battleline in France. Another gun may be sent to Vancouver. Lieutenant Art Mills, a New Westminster man, wrote the mayor of the town declaring the intention or his company to distribute German guns. "I suppose you have been reading about the big German advance, Lieutenant Mills wrote, 'We were in it. My company got five German machine guns. We were out five days altogether, in mud up to our waists at times, but casualties were light considering our operations. We attacked one of the strongest points on the western front and expect it will go down in history as one of the greatest battles. It is great to feel that one has come through something so big without a scratch. The last day, when we had them on the run across the open, was worth all the four months we spent on this spot. It was great. Our artillery did great execution. The ground was simply littered with German dead. We found some wonderful German dugouts, forty feet underground with furniture in them—bunks, stoves, cases of wine, cigars, cigarettes and food—in fact, we made some wonderful discoveries."
